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#### Introduction

Since the publication of THE BASKINS-BASKIN FAMILY in February 1957, additional material has come in, enough to warrant this supplement. Walter L. Hutcheson, of Houston, Texas, has supplied many pages of notes which have enabled the identification of the William (Ga.), James Stuart (Ga.), Robert (Miss.) and John (Miss.) branches. Histories have been published during the year by:
Dwight L. Baskin, Waukegan, Ill. on the William Baskin Family

L. D. McPherson, Tampa, Fla. on the Baskin, Calhoun, Hamilton, Noble, Pickens, Thompson Families

Much help has been received from many state offices, especially the Departments of Archives and History of Alabama, Georgia, and Mississippi. It has been possible to identify the Robert-Thomas-John branch as coming to Penna. from Ireland after the Revolution. Also a great deal of background has been found in three books not used previously:

J. F. Meginness, Origin and History of the Maginness Family

(Williamsport, Pa.1891)

R. L. Meriwether, The Expansion of South Carolina (Kingsport, Tenn. 1940)

H. M. Wilson, The Tinkling Spring, Headwater of Freedom (Fishersville, Va.1954) Wilson contains a number of records of the Baskin family in

Augusta Co. Virginia.

The distribution of the Baskins in the United States is well shown by the list which has been prepared of those who were in uniform 1861-1865. There is record of nearly one hundred.

# Early Records

The earliest record of Baskins in America has been located by Dwight L. Baskin. He found the record of marriage of Elizabeth Baskin and George Luke in Elizabeth City County, Va. Jan. 31-1701. (The name Baskin also appears 1639 on Chicahominy River, Va.)

The next record is the East Nottingham Twp., Chester Co., Pa. William Baskin(s) 1732 1734 1735 1735/36 tax list: 1735 1735/36 John Baskin(s)

The most complete early record of the Baskins is taken from the Orange Co., Va. Order Book 2, pg. 218:

At a Court held for Orange County on Thursday the 24th day of July 1740.... John Pickins made oath that he imported himself, Margret, Eleonor, Margret ye younger, Gabriel Pickens and Wm. Baskins from Iroland into Philadelphia and from thence into this Colony at his own charge and that this is yo first time of proving his and their right in order to obtain land which is ordered to be certified.

Augusta County was formed from Orange Co. in 1745. The Augusta Co. records show that John Pickens went to Va. from Paxton, Pa. More

# William Baskin Sr. (S. C.)

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to waterwheel gring grilling The Theater of

William Baskin Sr. came to America from Ireland about the fall of 1731, for his name first appears in Chester Co., Pa. records in 1732. By tradition he went to Paxton, Pa. about 1737. In July 1740 John Pickens appeared before the Orange Co., Va. court to say that he had imported himself and William Baskin with others from Ireland to Va. by way of Philadelphia. The statement was made to obtain land from Virginia. Augusta Co. was formed from Orange Co. in 1745. The Augusta Co. records show that John Pickens had gone to what is now Augusta Co. from Paxton, Pa. In Feb. 1740 he bought land in Va.

In Oct. 1746 William Baskin, John Pickens, James Lesslie and over thirty other families petitioned the governor and council of South Carolina to purchase from the Cherokee Indians the land around Ninety-Six and Long Cane and make it available for settlement. (Sca Meriwether pg. 124) This was done in 1747, but Indian troubles discouraged settlement. William Baskin gave up the idea of going to S. C., for in May 1747 he purchased 212 acres from John Pickens in Augusta Co., Virginia,

Widow Baskin is first mentioned in Augusta Co. in Feb. 1749. Her land adjoined John Pickens. She is mentioned in 1754 and 1761 deeds. She is likely the widow of Robert. Letters to settle Robert's estate were granted to William Baskin in 1750. Was Widow Baskin a Pickens or a sister of John Pickens! wife?

John Pickens got restless and loft Augusta Co. in 1754. From 1755 to about 1763 he was first on Catawba River, then Lynches River in north central S. C. By 1763 he had taken up land on Rocky River and Little River in District 96. This land became desirable with the end of the Indian wars about 1761. On June 7-1763 John, oldest son of William Baskin of Va. took up land on Long Cane, now waters of Little River. To this part of S.C. moved William Sr. and family.

November 1765 is the likely date for the migration of the Baskins from Augusta Co., Va. to what is now Abbeville Co., S.C. Meriwether says that the period from November to March was the most likely. The Virginia records show:

1765 May 14 Thomas witness to a deed
May 22 William Sr sold land
June 11 John got marriage license
Sept. 23 William Sr sold rest of land
Sept. 28 James got marriage license
Oct. 2 Charles got marriage license

Tradition says "when they were ready to go Thomas died." But all, including the widow of Thomas likely left in November 1765. After waiting nineteen years William Baskin got to South Carolina.

William Baskin and family attended Augusta (Stone) Presbyterian Church in Virginia; Rocky River Presbyterian Church in S. C. Charles Baskin returned in a few years to Va., where he attended Tinkling Spring Presbyterian Church.

James T. Baskin, grandson of James H. Baskin, wrote in 1914 from

Lowndesville, S. C.:

"William Baskin the head of the family came from Ireland to Juniata Valley, Penn. thence to near historic Stone Church, Va. and on to S. C." William Jr had "brothers Hugh, John, Thomas and Chas. with Patrick Calhoun's colony in Long Cane in Old Abbeville Dist." (Name of James omitted.) "William Baskin married Mary Stuart in Ireland. Our William Baskin (Jr) married Annie Reid Jan. 12-1769." "Wm. Baskin, Captain of Rangers in Revolutionary War lived and died in sight of where I now live. We have his commission sealed and signed by Gov. of S. C. Old and yellow framed." "James H. was the baby in Capt. Wm.'s set & the Baskins, Nobles, Pickens, &c. were all in Pat Calhoun's settlement, the first in Upper S. C. - Abbeville - then Dist. now county." "In my great-grandmother's Bible from which I sent record it is spelled Adam Foiles." Adam Files married Mary Baskin, dau. Wm. Jr.

The Baskins, Pickens' and Calhouns all likely came from County Donegal, Ireland. The Calhouns went to Pa. 1733; to Va. 1745; to the Long Cane country of S.C. 1756. The father died in Pa. in 1741, the mother was killed by Cherokee Indians in S.C. in 1760. The Pickens' were in Pa. in the 1730s, Va. in the 1740s, S.C. in the 1750s.

Most of the Abbeville Baskins moved west after 1800.

Hugh's sons went to Tenn., one later to Ark.

James' sons went first to Ga., one later to Ala., another to Miss.,

John stayed in S.C.

John's son went to Miss.

William's sons went first to Ala., later to Miss., James H. stayed in S.C.

Of William's five daughters:

Rosannah and Mary died in Goorgia, and Alabama, respectively. Elizaboth and Margaret died in Missouri. Ann died in Alabama, where her brothers had settled.

His Excelley laid before the Board the following Petition he had received from Sundry Inhabitants of the back parts of Virginia, humbly showing that the Petitors have had a great expectation to hear by John Turk that the lands granted at 96 was purchased as Thomas Turk has informed them; that the Council did promise them that such a purchase should be obtained last March. That the petitioners trusting to his word have fully resolved to remove their families but as no certain account has been brought them of the purchase having been mado, the same put a stop to their moving. Wherefore if the Governor will soon make a real purchase of that land laid a part for them and then communicate the same to Thomas Turk, that so they may be informed of the truth thereof, if they then can with safety, they will remove and come there; That the petitioners are informed that there are many loose persons who bear a bad character in some of those back parts and hope the Council will give them no manner of encouragement by letting them settle on any of that land, until they have time to hear of the purchase, and then to come and have their lot amongst us, they rely of the Comency of the government in granting their request.

## Baskin - Calhoun - Pickens

Present information shows that the: Baskins came from County Donogal, Ireland about 1731 and settled in Hast Nottingham Twp., Choster Co., Pa. - going to Paxton Twp., then Lancaster, now Dauphin Co., Pa about 1737 - to Augusta Co., Va. about 1740 - to Abbeville Co., S. C. 1765. Galhouns came from County Donegal, Ireland in 1733 and settled at Chostnut Level, Drumore Twp., Lancaster Co., Pa., where Patrick died in 1741. (The Chestnut Level Presbyterian Cometery has a grave of James Calhoun 1696-1777.) The widow and children went to Augusta (mow Wythe) Co., Va. about 1746 and to Abbeville Co., S. C. 1756. Pickens came from Ireland about 1720 and settled in Bonsalem Twp., Eucks Co., Pa. where the father, likely William, died. Before 1739 they were in Paxton Twp., then Lancaster, now Dauphin Co., Pa. In the 1740s they were in Augusta Co., Va. - 1750s Waxhaw region, N. C - 1760s Abboville Co., S. C. Apparently the Baskin and Pickens families first became acquainted in Paxton. There is no record of the Baskins and Calhouns becoming acquainted until after the Baskins went to South Carolina.

# John Baskin(s)

The discovery of the marriage record of Elizabeth Baskin (likely ridow of John of S. C.) to John Cunningham Feb. 22-1768 indicates that John Baskin died soon after writing his will Oct. 25-1767. It was probated Jan. 26-1769 at Charleston, which was many miles from the Long Cane section. The marriage of another Elizabeth Baskin in S. C. on Mar. 6-1768 to Israel Pickens is likely the marriage of Elizabeth, born Doc. 1745, daughter of William Baskin, and

Israel Pickens, born Aug. 24-1744, son of John Pickens. Their fathers were long time friends.

The ddath of John Baskin, son of William of S. C., about Nov. 1-1767 means that the trip (see p. 31) made in the summer of 1768 by John Baskins and others in Ky. and Tenn. - which resulted in their capture by Indians and their removal to Detfoit - was made by John Baskins, son of William Baskins of Pa. This John evidently went to South Carolina soon after his Virginia cousins, Perhaps this 1768 trip was the reason for his settling in Tennessee, where he was living in 1780. One can only wonder whether at Detroit he saw his younger brother, who had been captured by the Indians 1756.

John (S.C.) b c1731, to Paxton 1737, to Va. 1740, to S. C. 1763, returned to Va. to be married 1765, to S. C. with family 1765, d 1767 S. C.

John (Pa.) b c1745 Pa., 1756 father killed by Indians, before 1768 to S. C., trip from S. C. to Ky. and Tonn. 1768; 1774 in S. C., 1780 in Tonnessec.

## Andrew Baskin

The date of Andrew Baskin's death has not been ascertained. It was likely between Apr. 5-1790 when his stock mark was listed in the Lancaster Co., S.C. records and Dec. 10-1793 when his three sons are listed as guardians for his Stewart grandchildren. He likely died before Kershaw County was formed - 1791. The Lancaster County probate records have been destroyed.

There is no certain record of the name of his father. Andrew may have been a son of Robert Baskin, who died before February 1749 in Augusta Co., Va. Certainly Andrew was born in Ireland. His name first appears in Augusta records in 1752. The South Carolina land that he received in 1761 was surveyed in 1756 for another person. There is no record of a son or grandson named Robert. Andrew's oldest son was John. The family tradition that Andrew's father was John Baskin has not been verified.

It seems as if Andrew was related to the Pickens! Perhaps his mother was a Pickens or a sister of one of the Pickens wives. In 1753 Andrew Baskin and John Pickens witnessed a deed together. In 1750 Andrew Pickens and in 1754 John Pickens went to the Waxhaw section of N.C.-S.C. Andrew Baskin followed soon after. A number of Pickens names are found in the Andrew Baskin branch: Eleanor, Andrew, Joseph, Margaret, Samuel.

## John Pickens

The names of John Pickens and William Baskin appear together a number of places. John Pickens was born in Ireland and came to America about 1720 with his father, likely William Pickens. The Pickens family first settled in Bensalem Twp., Bucks Co., Pa. on the eastern edge of Philadolphia. About 1735 they moved to Paxton Twp., now Dauphin Co., Pa. It is likely here that John Pickens was married and became acquainted with William Baskin.

The Baskins and Pickens' likely moved to Augusta Co., Va. in the winter of 1739-40. John Pickens bought 764 acros for £24 on Feb. 27-1740, The importation record of the Pickens' and Baskins shows that John imported his wife, Eleanor; mother, Margaret; younger brother, Gabriel; and sister, Margaret, as well as the Baskin family. The record should be read to mean that they all came to Virginia together from Penna. It is not likely that it means that they all came together from Ireland, rather that they were all natives of Ireland. but in July 1740 were declaring themselves inhabitants of Virgnia in order to qualify for land. John Pickens sold 212 acros of his land in Va. to William Baskin in 1747. This was after their attempt in October 1746 to get land in South Carolina had failed.

John Pickens or his wife may have been related to the widow of Robert Baskin. She owned land adjoining John Pickens in 1749. In 1753 John Pickens and Andrew Baskin witnessed a deed together. About the end of 1754 it is likely that John Pickens went to the Waxhaw section of N. C. In 1756 he took up land on Lynches Creek in north central South Carolina. By 1765 he was likely in the Long Cane country - Abbeville County, S. C. William Baskin went from Va. to S. C. 1765-66. In 1768 William's daughter, Elizabeth, married John's son, Israel.

There is record in Va. of John Pickens as militia captain in 1742, mill owner 1744, magistrate 1745. He was a cattle man in Pa., Va., and S. C. He was mill owner and magistrate in S. C. Baptism records of five children are listed at Old Stone Church, Va.

John Pickens had several brothers: Israel, Andrew, Gabriel and likely Robert and William. Israel's name appears in Pa. about 1722; Augusta Co., Va. 1740; Cub Creek region of Va. 1748-49. He died about 1750, for his widow's name appears in N.C. 1754. Andrew's name appears in Pa. 1727; Paxton 1739; Augusta Co. 1745-50; What is now Mecklenburg Co., N.C. 1750 until his death about 1756. He was the father of General Andrew Pickens (1739-1817). Gabriel's name appears in Augusta Co., Va. 1740-64; he went to Abbovillo about 1764, Where he died a number of years later.

Robert who died in Anderson Co., S.C. 1793 and William who died in Montgomery Co., Va. 1783 may have been brothers of John Pickens. William was in Augusta Co., Va. for many years. It may have been his daughter, Margaret who married (?) James Baskin 1765.

In 1811 Andrew Pickens, Jr. wrote that he had been born in Paxton Two., Pa. in 1739. His father had come from Ireland. His grandfather left France as a boy soon after 1685.

## Baskins in Canada

The only record of the Baskin family in Canada is found in those who migrated to Wisconsin:

## i. Robort Baskin (Pa.)

Robert Baskin, a fuller, moved from Northumberland Co., Pa. in 1808 to Buffalo Twp., Perry Co., Pa. and purchased a 54 acro farm. His will was written Aug. 25-1813 with a codicil Aug. 25-1814. It was probated at Carlisle, Pa. June 1-1815. Besides mentioning his wife and children, he mentions his "dear brother Thomas" of Northumberland Co. and his brother-in-law, John McGinness. Robert Baskin and his wife are buried at the Hill Church, near New Buffalo. The stone of Robert reads "Died Apr. 14-1814 Aged 53". According to his will he died in 1815. His wife's stone reads Catharine Baskin "Died Sopt 30-1824 Aged 74". She was hardly this old.

The Maginness Family history says that John McGinnes(s) married c1793 Sarah Baskin b 1776. The 1850 Census shows that Sarah was born in Ireland. This means that Robert, Thomas, John (a third brother - see j) and Sarah came to Perry Co. from Ireland in the late 1780s. If John of Mercer b 1788 Pa. was a son of Thomas, then the Baskins camo about 1786 or 1787. In 1793 in the militia from what is now Perry Co, are listed Thomas Baskin and John McGinness. Robert was likely married in Ireland, for his oldest son, John was born in 1785. The earliest record of Robert in Pa. is the birth of his son, Oliver in 1795. Since Robert, Thomas and John each named their oldest sons John, it is likely that their father was John Baskin. He probably died in Ireland. The McGinness family came to Pa. from Co. Down, Ireland in 1790. The name Oliver is found in this Baskin branch. Oliver is also found in Canada in 1846 and in Ireland in 1810.

It is likely that this Baskin branch was related to the Baskins who settled at the mouth of the Juniata. James Baskins who was born in Ireland c1720 was still living in 1787. The John of Ireland may have been his cousin. Elso why did Robert and others come to the Baskinsvillo area from Iroland? It could hardly be a coincidenco.

The most famous Baskins descendant is Alexander Hamilton Stephens, grandson of Alexander and Catherine Baskins Stephens. A full account of the Stephens connection is given in a 24-page booklet ALEXANDER STEPHENS 1727-1814 published by Raymond M. Bell and Robert G. Stephons in 1956. Since the publication of that booklet one additional fact has been discovered verifying the residence of Stephens 1770-78. John F. Moginness in History of the West Branch Valley (1889) p.401 lists the members and notes of a surveying party which laid out in 1775 or 1776 one of the first roads in Nortumberland Co. - a road along the Susquehanna River from Lock Haven via Williamsport to Sunbury. The men in this party were?

Richard Mallono (Turbot), Amariah Sutton (now Williamsport), Alexir Stephens, Marcus Hulings (Turbot). Stephens no doubt lived in Turbot, for his father-in-law had land there.

#### McGINNISS

The writer found several James McGinniss; before 1790. From the Maginness family history he transcribed, thanks to Mrs. Vasco Laub,

of Salt Lake City:

James McGinnes b 1739 came to America from County Down, Ireland in 1790, landing at Fhiladelphia. After a few months there he moved to Buffalo (then Greenwood) Twp., now Porry Cp., Pa. Here his son, James Jr, bought a 322 acro farm (originally survey order grandted 1773 to Job Hughos) for \$322. James Sr was a farmer and a Presbyterian. In 1795 ho was assessed for 100 acros, 2 horses, 2 cows and 1 still. In 1799 the names of James Jr and John appear; in 1808 George, Richard, John and James Jr's widow Mary are assessed. The name is spelled McGinnes, McGinness, McGinnis, McGinniss.

Jamos Sr d Jan. 7-1804; his wife Mary Cochran b 1743 d Aug. 25-1805. Thoy and sons John and James are buried in the Hill Church cemetery, near New Buffalo. Here in the same lot lie the Robert Baskin family. The known children of James Sr and Mary are:

#### 1934 SUMMARY (Revised)

At the point in Pennsylvania where the Juniata River flows into the Susquehanna River lie two islands. The larger one of 677 acres is high and rocky and is known today as "Haldeman's Island." The other one, 305 acres in size, is flat and alluvial and today is called "Duncan's Island," although it is no longer separated from the mainland. The larger island has often been called the "Big Island." The islands and the east shore of the Susquehanna lie in Dauphin (formerly Lancaster) County. The west shore of the Susquehanna lies in Perry (formerly Cumberland) County.

The first record of the white man attempting to settle here was in 1733 when John Harris tried to settle at the mouth of the Juniata, but the Indians protested and he was forced to leave. In 1745 when David Brainard, a missionary, visited the Big Island, then known as "Juniata Island," he found a tribe of Conoy Indians living on it. Permanent settlement by the white man did not begin until 1750. The Big Island was warranted by the Proprietaries in 1760. It was then known as "Baskins Island." At the southern tip were remains of an "Old Conoy Town." The Proprietaries also warranted Duncan's Island. A rough map of the region drawn in 1762 by Marcus Hulings gave the location of the early settlers.

About 1750 three brothers, Francis, James, and William Baskins, took up land at the junction of the rivers. The Hulings map showed where they located. Francis settled on the lower end of the Big Island, where he claimed 150 acres. James took up land at the mouth of the Juniata on the west side, and soon established a ferry. In February 1767 he had been living there for sixteen years. The hamlet that grew up about the west landing was called "Baskinsville" - now upper Duncannon. The old burying ground on the bluff is still called the "Baskinsville Graveyard." William Baskins took up land on Duncan's Island and also two other tracts: one of 238 acres (warrant issued to his heirs in 1766) in Rye Township on the Little Juniata Creek; and a claim for 200 acres in the same township on the south bank of the Juniata River, several miles above the mouth.

The first record that we have of William Baskins is in 1744 when he was one of the party which investigated the killing of Jack Armstrong, a trader, by the Indians. Then he probably lived at or near Paxtang. About this year he was married. The name of his wife does not appear in the records. In 1747-8 William Baskins was an ensign under Captain Thomas McKee in the Associated Regiments of the West End of Lancaster County on the Susquehanna River. In 1750 William Baskins with his wife and family moved to Duncan's Island where he erected a house. He was the first settler on the island and was listed in the 1750-51 assessments. Here they lived until the Indian outbreak following the Braddock defeat of July 1755, when all the settlers were driven to the forts for safety. William with his wife and five children, John, Moses, Margaret, Ann, and the youngest was forced to leave his home and go to Fort Hunter, while the Indians were on the warpath. As one of the defenders of the fort, he made several excursions with armed bands from time to time to learn the intentions of the Indians.

In the following summer there seemed to be a cessation of Indian attacks, and as William Baskins had a crop of grain on the island, with a hired man named McClean, his wife and two children, a girl of seven and a boy of three, he returned to harvest it. As nearly as we can ascertain it was July 29, 1756. While at work, the men were startled by warcries. Seeing that the Indians were hostile, the man McClean jumped into the river, swam to a small island in the Juniata, known as "Shoop Island," hid and escaped. Baskins ran to the house, but while reaching for his gun, he was shot dead and scalped. The wife and two children were carried away captive.

Margaret (Peggy), the girl of seven, was carried to the Miami country, then a wilderness in Ohio. She remained in captivity until November 15, 1764 when in accordance with a treaty after Bouquet's victory, she was returned. She was one of "sixty prisoners surrendered by the Indians" and "taken by Captain Charles Lewis from the English Camp at the Forks of the Muskingum to Fort Pitt."

The mother, according to all the histories, when in the vicinity of Carlisle, escaped from the Indians and got safely back to the fort. Tradition says that the boy of three was carried to Canada where he was baptized, "Timothy Murphy," He was afterwards discovered by Alexander Stephens, a cousin by marriage, who identified him by a peculiar mark on the head. Stephens told him of his family, and "Murphy" visited the old home. In 1812 his nephew, James Smith, visited him in Canada, where he owned an estate at Malden, Ontario. When the estate of William Baskin was settled in 1770, the boy was assumed dead, for his name does not appear among the heirs.

The "Vidow" about 1765 married a neighbor, Francis Ellis. During the 1756 attacks all the buildings and fences on Duncan's Island were burned, and no one lived there for six or seven years. About 1762 the "Widow" rented the island to David Ross, who cleared 15 acres and erected a house. He was driven off by the Indians in 1763, but returned in 1765. In 1767 the former widow and her husband were living on one of his two farms on or near the Big Island. Francis Ellis, Sr. died in 1784 in Greenwood Township, Cumberland County.

The estate of William Baskins was not settled until May 15, 1770, although letters of administration in Cumberland County had been issued to his brother, James, in September 1756. The inventory was copied from "two obscure papers dated 1755." One item is "9 bushels wheat 1 L. 13 S. 7 P." Was it this that William gave his life trying to secure? The Court found the total balance 42 pounds, 19 shillings, and 6 pence, and decreed to the "Widdow" (name not given) 14 L. 6 S. 1 P. and to the children as follows: to John "eldest son," 11 L. 9 S. 2 P.; to Moses "second son," to Margaret "eldest daughter," to Ann "second daughter" each 5 L. 14 S. 7 P. Both of the sons, John and Moses were then of full age, probably 25 and 23, respectively, with Margaret, 21, and Ann, 19.

In 1774 John was a blacksmith in District 96, South Carolina. That year Moses was assessed in Rye Township, Cumberland County. Margaret married John Smith. We have record of one of their children, James Baskins Smith, who was born along the Juniata River April 4, 1777. He lived in Perry County. A granddaughter of his, Miss Annie P. Smith, was living at Lewistown in 1932. About 1773 Ann Baskins married Joseph Martin, son of Samuel of Paxtang, and they established a home by the mills in the great bend of the Juniata, a few miles above the Big Island. A daughter, Mary, was born February 13, 1774 at the new home, but two sons, Samuel and Joseph, were born at the home of their grandmother on the Big Island while their father was in the army "from which he never returned." Samuel was born September 17, 1775 and Joseph July 20, 1777. Samuel settled in Mifflin County, where his descendants still live. We know little about the home on the Big Island. Among the neighbors we find the Hulings, Clark, Watts, Reed and Atkinson families.

James Baskins, brother of William, operated a ferry at the junction of the rivers for nearly forty years. He administered the estates of William (1756) and Francis (1761). He warranted 300 acres of land at the mouth of the Juniata in 1766. He died at Baskinsville in January 1788 and was buried in the old cemetery on the bluff. His wife, Elizabeth----, died in June 1792. James Baskins by his will probated at Carlisle, February 11, 1788 gave to each of his daughters, Elizabeth McCoy, Catherine Stephens, Sarah Dougherty, and Jane Jones, five pounds then after providing for life occupancy of his wife, he gave all the rest to his son, Mitchell, subject to maintenance of his son, Francis, for life. Mitchell Baskins

born October 6, 1754 died April 10, 1809, was a ferryman near Duncannon. He married Margaret ---- born July 5, 1769, died December 9, 1814. Cornelius, a son, continued to operate the ferry. His descendants still live around Duncannon. Catherine Baskins, eldest daughter of James, about 1766 married Alexander Stephens. After the Revolution he with his wife and family migrated to Wilkes County, Georgia, where he died in 1814, aged 87. Catherine Baskins Stephens died at Kettle Creek, Georgia in 1794. The youngest of their ten children was Andrew Baskins Stephens, who was born in Penna. in 1782 and died in Georgia 1826. Andrew was father of Alexander Hamilton Stephens, vice president of the Confederacy.

The third brother, Francis Baskins, died in August 1761. Letters of administration in Lancaster County were issued to his brother, James August 31, 1761. Francis was named in William's estate. He was assessed as a trader at the Big Island as early as 1751. His widow was assessed as "Widow Baskin," in Upper Paxton Township until 1787. We have the name of one son, George, who in 1789 sold his share of the lower end of the Big Island which his father had improved, but had not warranted. Another son was William, of Dauphin County. Robert, of Perry County, and Thomas of Northumberland County were likely nephews.

The fact that John Baskins migrated to South Carolina, and the Stephens just over the line into Georgia would seem to link this Baskins family with the William Baskin, who went from Pennsylvania to the Shenandoah Valley in Virginia (Augusta County) about 1740. About 1767 he migrated to Abbeville, South Carolina. His sons were: Hugh, Charles. (1741-1822), James, John, William, and Thomas. William and Mary Baskin are listed in Augusta County records as early as 1745 and as late as 1765. In 1750 William administered the estate of Robert Baskin. If Robert was the brother of this William, he may have been an uncle of the Pennsylvania brothers. Descendants of the South Carolina William still live around Abbeville. An Andrew Baskin lived in Virginia as contemporary of William later going to Kershaw Co., S.C.
