Location of Grave of Michael Kinard, Sr. (11-30-1754 to 5-6-1839)

Michael Kinard, Sr. is buried in the old Schumpert Cemetery near Newberry and Silverstreet.

Take SC Hwy 395 south from Newberry, 8.1 miles to the intersection of Counts Sausage Road on the left. There is a ramshackle building on the corner as you turn onto Counts Sausage Road. A large Confederate flag is painted on the side of the building, locally called the "Sugar Shack". Proceed 6 to 7/10ths of a mile and on the right should be a little shed with a tin roof.

The road leads generally downward toward Bush River. On the right is a highway curve sign and another 50-100 yards up on a bank is an electric pole. A few yards on, the bank starts slanting off to ditch level and at that point you should turn into the cut over woods and brush going up the hill some 150-200 paces to the cemetery. It has a wire fence with stone corner posts and a gate that is off its hinges. At the time of our visit on March 25, 1993, the woods surrounding the cemetery had been clear cut so the site should be fairly easily spotted; however, the brush will grow back quickly and in time will again be difficult to see, especially as there is no maintenance on the plot.

As you enter the gate, there is a mausoleum, and at the left there is a grave marker leaning toward the mausoleum--this is Michael's grave. His daughter and her husband Frederick Schumpert are buried nearby.

Hubert had located the cemetery years ago and had made a snapshot of Michael's tombstone; however, he did not leave a specific location other than it was the Schumpert Cemetery near Silverstreet. This turned out to be a key lead in our later being able to locate the cemetery. Otis Walker's wife Kathy had an uncle that was related to the Schumperts. He had recalled cleaning off the square when he was a lad. He led Otis to the location and afterwards Otis and I visited it. So that Joel would be acquainted with the

Unfortunately, we do not have the location of Michael's wife, Catherine Swedenbourg (Swittenberg) who died in 1803. There was no listing in the compilation of tombstone inscriptions for Newberry County. She may have been buried in a private plot near one of their homesites.

There was nothing in the notes made by my brother Hubert as to the location of Michael, Jr.'s grave although I am sure Hubert must have visited the site on more than one occasion.

From the article written by Rev. W. A. Betts, one of the pastors who served St. Paul's Methodist at Ninety Six, it was learned that Drayton Tucker Kinard had joined Zion Methodist Church near Prosperity, just before the War Between the States. Also it was indicated that Drayton was born at the family home about "four miles Southeast of Prosperity" which has probably in the vicinity of Zion Methodist Church.

On July 19, 1991, after I had visited the Schumpert Cemetery near Newberry and Silverstreet to find Michael Kinard, Sr.'s grave, I thought it might be productive to find Zion Methodist Church to see what the cemetery there might contain in the way of Kinard graves. Almost immediately after arrival there I spotted Michael, Jr.'s tombstone. Buried beside him was his wife, Nancy Harmon Stockman, who had married Col. John H. Stockman after the early demise of Michael, Jr. In the immediate vicinity was the grave of Bennett J. Kinard, his son, a 1st Lt. who was killed on August 30, 1862, at the second battle of Manassas.

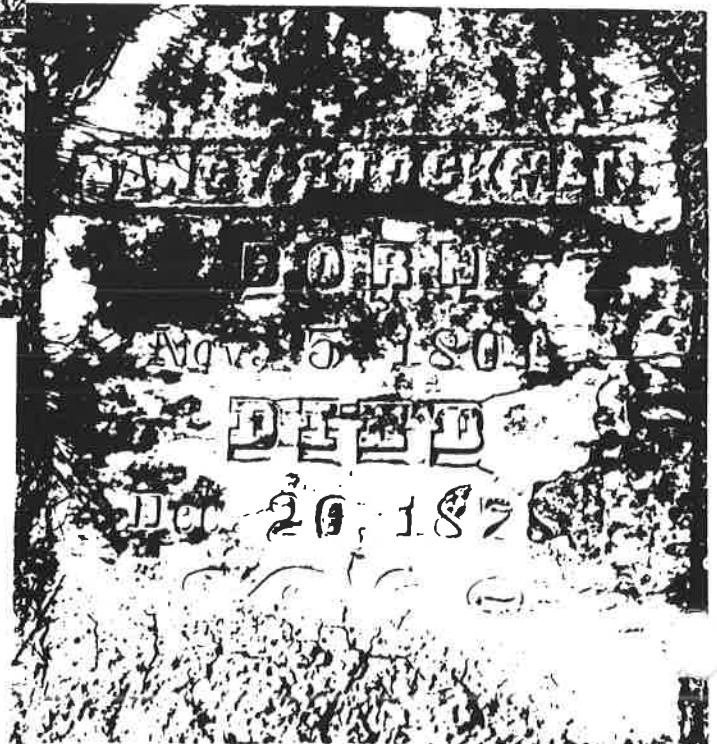
Zion Methodist Church is located 4.6 miles southeast of Prosperity on SC Highway 391 to Batesburg. There is a bend in the highway, Sligh's Superette is on the left where a straight road leaves Hwy 391 just before the curve. A little way on the right a sign indicates the direction to Zion Church on a road by the same name--this road crosses back to Hwy 391 in just a few hundred yards.

When you enter the drive to the church, proceed right up to the church at the left side. Stop about 2/3 of the way back. On the left is a monument with WARNER. A couple of rows back of that you can see Michael Kinard, Jr.'s stone. Nancy's grave is alongside but the marker lies flat on the ground. Also nearby you can spot Bennett J. Kinard's grave.

There may be other Kinards in that vicinity but because of time considerations I did not examine any more closely.

Actually the graves of Michael, Sr. and Michael, Jr. are not very far apart. A look at the Newberry County map will show that the Schumpert Cemetery is over on SC Hwy 395. Leave that area going east. Pick up Stoney Hill Road until it intersects SC Hwy 391 which parallels Hwy 395. Turn right for a couple of miles and you come to Zion Church.

KINARD (Map D, Number 72)

The Kinard Cemetery is four miles south of Ninety Six on the west side of State Highway 246. The land was part of a former Kinard plantation. A masonry wall is around the large graveyard which was established in the 1870's.

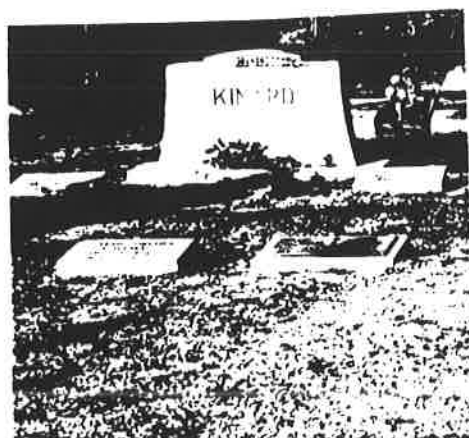

This feature article appeared in the Greenwood INDEX JOURNAL under the title, "Epworth Holds Residents" in the issue of April 29, 1984.

There is a sense of permanence about Epworth, a small rural community 10 miles south of Greenwood where people live to ripe old ages and families remain generation after generation.

Epworth has always been an agricultural community and, very probably, will continue as such for generations to come.

The Kinard family first came to what is now Epworth shortly after the War Between the States. Jeff Kinard, along with his two brothers, Calvin and Drayton, became farmers — Jeff amassing more than 2,000 acres in his lifetime and leaving it to his six sons and three daughters, equally divided.

J. Pickens Kinard increased his inheritance over the years to also include 2,000 acres.

"IN THE 1800's there was a Kinard & Son's General Merchandise store," said H.B. "Ben" Kinard, son of Pickens Kinard. "My grandfather ran that store and it had general merchandise and farm supplies. At that time, the mail for Epworth came there."

Kinard has been a farmer all his life and remembers the changes in agriculture.

"My daddy farmed with mules," he said. "The land was cultivated with a mule-drawn plow. A lot of blacks worked on the land as sharecroppers. In those days, we planted mostly cotton."

"I remember before the boll weevil came, a noted entomologist said it would be impossible for the boll weevil to survive the cold winters in Greenwood County — but he was wrong. When the cotton crop failed, many of the sharecroppers were forced to migrate to the cities seeking employment."

"As farm labor disappeared, mules were replaced with tractors. I remember when 178 was a dirt road and we would ride bikes all the way to Greenwood."

Kinard recalls, from his youth, an elderly black man called Uncle Mose Weeks:

"UNCLE MOSE said he helped build the Southern Railroad. They used shovels and wheelbarrows. And he could weave fish baskets and cotton baskets by hand. Some of his work was really beautiful."

"He used to make my dad mule and horse collars by hand. I guess his art must have descended directly from his African heritage."

Kinard attended school at the old Fellowship Baptist Church.

"We studied by kerosene lamps," Kinard recalled. "We

didn't get electricity around here until the 1930's. Things were tough back then and although we enjoyed life then, I wouldn't want to go back."

Ben Kinard's son, Dr. H.B. Kinard Jr., is a Greenwood veterinarian. Dr. H.B. Kinard III is a Greenwood gastroenterologist.

Ben Kinard's sister, Marie Kinard Moyd, lives only a mile or so down the road.

"I have lived here all my life, except for seven years," she said. "I lived in Nashville with my husband. We had three sons and then he died in 1931, so I came home. It wasn't easy, but somehow I knew I was going to make it."

In the mid-1930's, a year after her father's death, the family home burned to the ground.

"I WAS OUT in the field behind the house planting corn when we heard the farm bell ring," she called. "That always meant something was wrong. We went running up to the house and I saw the smoke billowing out from the house. I left two of my children in the house, and, fortunately they were saved by my sister, Christine."

"We lost everything — even the silver," she said. "It had all been melted by the heat and I sold it in

one lump for \$20. We had to start completely over. We watched over a buffalo nickel then like you'd watch over a much larger amount of money today."

Mrs. Moyd was accustomed to starting over. She raised her three sons and put them all through college. One of these sons became a doctor. After they finished college, they encouraged her, at age 46, to become a teacher.

"I taught the first grade," she said. "Those children were all precious. They think you are a queen dropped down from heaven."

She taught at Fairview, C bridge and Hodges before taking mandatory retirement.

"I guess you can say I'm an optimist," she said.

A son of Lawson Kinard and grandson of Jeff Kinard, is Jefferson McDuffie Kinard, who, along with his wife, Sara, lives in the home purchased by his father, Henry Lawson Kinard.

The house dates back as early as 1817. In 1832, John Cothran purchased the house and called it "Hickory Grove."

IN 1840, Col. Richard Griffin purchased the home and added more acreage to the property. His son, Nathan L. Griffin, inherited it, and, during the next 40 years the house belonged to J.B. Sullivan, Wright Nicholson Moore and Henry Mays.

In 1891, Henry Lawson Kinard purchased the home, which he embellished in 1905. Jeff Kinard has lived here all his life. His daughter Virginia and her husband Jack Epps live in the house. Their two sons, Harold Jackson and Jefferson Allen, have also lived in the house. Harold's son, David Matthew, lives nearby.

"That's five generations of Kinards who have seen this house," said Mrs. Epps, with pride.

According to Jeff Kinard, the large oak trees in front of the house had, in ante-bellum days, been a place of slave trading. There is still a withering slave cabin near what was once the main house. When Col. Griffin owned the house, he kept a walnut casket in the attic, built under his specifications and later used for his burial.

Henry Mays, who later owned the house, had a daughter suffering from tuberculosis and had a coffin sent up and kept in an outside building awaiting her demise.

Jeff Kinard recalls riding an old

gray horse to Fellowship school.

"I remember when the horse got sick and we had Dr. Tom Kinard — my uncle, who was a veterinarian, doctor him. They put a rope round the horse's mouth and threw the rope over a limb and pulled the mouth up. He gave him molasses and sulphur.

"I REMEMBER one time when I took my sister to her music lessons. On the way, I got water and mud all over my pants. I had to go back to school with my seat red with mud.

"We used to go possum hunting at night. I recall one time one bit me. I guess I was lucky I didn't get rabies, but I just didn't worry about it at the time."

The son of Calvin Kinard was W.P.B. "Pierce" Kinard. Pierce and his brother Henry lived at the present home of Mrs. Frances Kinard Davis, daughter of Henry Kinard. After they were married, Pierce Kinard built a large victorian-style one-story house in 1895, where his son Calvin (Sr.) was born that same year.

The home of Frances Kinard Davis was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1983.

According to John Blythe, historic

preservation planner for the Upper Savannah Council of Governments, the home was built by Wright Nicholson Moore in the 1830's. Between 1835 and 1875 the community was known as Phoenix, although Phoenix later moved southwest of what is now Epworth. Before 1835, Epworth was known as Holloway.

What is now Mrs. Davis' home remained in the Moore family until the 1880's, when her father and uncle, Pierce, purchased it.

Pierce Kinard is credited with establishing the Kinard Methodist Church in 1887 — which still thrives today — and the Epworth Camp Meeting grounds in 1907. The camp is also active each summer.

"PIERCE KINARD gave land and supervised the building of the church," said his son, Cal. "He used to say he spent as many days building the church as Nehemiah spent building Jerusalem.

"He also gave Epworth its name in the 1890's. It was named after John Wesley's home in England. Epworth had a post office, funeral parlors for blacks and whites, and a millinery shop and a doctor, J.W. Payne, who left with the boll weevil."

Eugene Bowers ran the store for many years.

"We still get mail addressed to Epworth," interjected Mrs. Em Kinard, Cal Kinard's wife since 1928. "Although it comes to Ninety Six now."

Cal Kinard is 89 and his wife is 84, yet it is hard to believe they are out of their 60's.

"I work one day a week as a volunteer for the Greenwood Nursing Home," says Mrs. Kinard. "I push around people a lot younger than me in wheelchairs."

For the first 19 years of their marriage, Cal and Em Kinard lived in a small cottage in the front yard of Cal's home. In 1948, they built a house next door to his home. In later years, the cottage was occupied by Cal Jr. and his wife, and other young couples.

"We call it the honeymoon cottage," says Mrs. Kinard.

ALTHOUGH THESE Kinards have not planted cotton since the boll worm invaded them in 1977, they have planted around 240 acres this year and plan to use the old cotton gin, which is in the center of Epworth.

This time, Cal Jr. is planting the crop, with able assistance by Cal Sr.

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Taylor, the daughter and son-in-law of Cal and Em Kinard, are in the process of restoring the home built by Pierce Kinard, where they plan to move.

"They feel it is important to preserve a family heritage," Mrs. Kinard said.

Another famous Kinard was Po' Mike Kinard, son of Drayton Kinard. He owned 8,000 acres of land and purchased a large home between Epworth and Greenwood. After he added to the massive structure in 1910, it became the largest home in Greenwood County, according to information from "Greenwood County Sketches." It is currently the home of Mr. and Mrs. C.A. Traynum.

Po' Mike was called that to distinguish him from another Mike Kinard. Po' Mike, however, was hardly poor, but he was thin.

In addition to cotton, he had saw mills. At the time of his death, he was reported to be the largest land owner in Greenwood County.

Mrs. Katie Warner, who lives on Mt. Moriah Road, was the niece of Po' Mike's wife. After her mother's death, she lived with the Kinards from the age of 10 months until her marriage.

"**HE HAD A** saw mill and a traveling cotton gin — he ginned his own cotton," said Mrs. Warner. "He had crop hands, wager hands and an overseer. He sent me to Columbia College, although when I returned, I just helped him run the place until I got married."

Mrs. Warner remembers him as being "one of the best men in the world."

Alfred Carter, who has lived in Epworth all his life, worked many years for Po' Mike.

when he sold all of his cotton — they just ran out of money."

Carter, first cousin of black educator Dr. Benjamin Mays, worked for Will Henderson before working for Po' Mike Kinard.

"We went to the Mt. Zion Baptist Church school together," Carter recalled. "We played together. I knew he was going to be a big shot someday."

A monument marking the spot Dr. Mays was born is located four miles south of Epworth, toward Saluda. He later became president of Morehouse College, influencing young Martin Luther King and many other black leaders.

Recently following his death, a memorial service was held at Mt. Zion Baptist Church, where his parents are buried.

ALTHOUGH WILL HENDERSON grew up in neighboring Phoenix, he purchased a large home called "Sunnyside" near Epworth when his son Nat was under a year old. The house had previously belonged to the Andrews and Thompkins families.

On their property today, Nat Henderson is familiar with several old, otherwise forgotten graveyards. One is of the Childs family, some of the

first settlers in the area, born in the late 1700's in Culpepper County, Va.

Another is the Fellowship Baptist cemetery and the ruins of the church itself. In recent years, vandals have destroyed some of the tombs in the historic cemetery.

Although Henderson is too young to have attended Fellowship school, he did go — by buggy — to school in Ninety Six. The five mile buggy ride took one hour and 15 minutes. Although, if Ninety Six Creek (originally called Cambridge Creek) was too high, that meant going almost into Greenwood to get to school.

Henderson worked many years for Kaiser Agricultural Chemicals before retiring and living in his Epworth home, which was built in 1880.

According to Henderson, Gov. "Pitchfork" Ben Tilman was born in the Epworth vicinity. Dan Thompkins, who had lived in the Henderson house, and was a University of Edinburg graduate, served as secretary of state.

HENDERSON'S NEPHEW, Greg Henderson, and Bill Barnett will also be planting cotton this year on what is called "The Territory" — in the vicinity of Tilman Territory Road near Epworth.

Just as nature renews itself each spring, Epworth, as a community, seems to renew itself with each new generation. Maybe cotton can never be the cash crop it once was — and yet, maybe it can. It all depends on Mother Nature's good humor and Uncle Sam's economic prosperity.

Somehow between the two, perhaps Epworth can maintain its sense of identity as a solid, secure agricultural community well into the 21st century.

CONFEDERATE ARMY SERVICE RECORDS

Confederate Army Service Records were examined for each of the four sons of Michael Kinard, Jr. Even though the information obtained was somewhat sketchy, it provides interesting bits about their time in the military service.

In the event someone may want to do further research in this connection, the source of this data is carefully annotated. National Archives Publications. Microcopy No. 267. Complete Service Records of Confederate Soldiers Who Served in Organizations From The State of South Carolina.

Individuals may be located on rolls of microfilm as follows:

Calvin Washington Kinard, designated as C. Kinard, served in the 3rd S.C. Cavalry, Microcopy 267, Roll 19, J-MA (alphabetical listing).

Bennett J. Kinard, served in Holcombe's Legion, Microcopy 267, roll 376, J-K (alphabetical listing).

Drayton T. Kinard, served in the 2nd S.C. Cavalry, Microcopy 267, roll 12, I-M (alphabetical listing).

J. McDuffie Kinard, served in Co. D, 5th Regiment of S.C. Infantry, microcopy 267, roll 194, HI-L (alphabetical listing).

Records Noted

C. Kinard, Pvt, Co. K, (Capt. H.C. Smart's Co., S.C. Volunteers), 2nd Regiment, 3rd S.C. Cavalry, enlisted "for the war", April 4, 1862, at Hardeeville, S.C. Valuation of horse, \$100 and equipment \$15. Muster rolls showed "present" through August, 1862. G. W. Kinard mustered as his substitute September 30, 1862. October, 1862, muster showed

"present without horse". Possibly this was his substitute as Calvin is shown as present for months of November-December. Records for 1863 are missing but musters for January-June, 1864, shows "present". On June 18, 1864, record shows "transferred to German Light Artillery (Brockman)". No record was found on this unit. One payment voucher showed Calvin was paid \$10 for use of horse, \$7 for mileage. One entry showed him stationed at Camp Allen, but no address given.

Bennett J. Kinard, joined Holcombe's Legion as 2nd Lt. on January 7, 1862. This location was Camp Hams, and in next three months he was stationed at Camps Walsh, Blair and Capers, the latter near Adams Run, S.C. Records show that he was in "state service" until 5-1-1862 thence to "confederate service". Pay vouchers bearing his signature show he drew \$80 monthly as 2nd Lt. Register of May 1, 1862, shows he was promoted to 1st Lt. His pay vouchers for May through July indicate he drew \$90 monthly as a 1st Lt. An updated register shows he was killed August 30, 1862, in 2nd Battle of Manassas. An entry dated July, 1863, showed claim of "deceased officers's widow filed by Permelia A. Kinard."

Drayton T. Kinard, Pvt Co. D 2nd Regiment, S.C. Cavalry. Muster on 4-30-1864 shows "present" for March-April - "transferred from Post Guard" April 30, 1864. Muster for May-June shows "absent special furlough" but adds "returned since May." July-August muster indicates "present" and "paid \$49 for use of horse." November-December, 1864, shows "present". No other records were found. Post Guard Columbia appeared as station from which he was transferred to Co. D. There is no record of a separate outfit - Post Guard - It could have been part of the 2nd S.C. Cavalry.

J. McDuffie Kinard, Pvt 2nd Co. D, 5th Regiment, S.C. Infantry. Muster on 7-20-1862 shows enlisted in Columbia for "three years." Muster rolls for November-December,

1862, show "present". January through August, 1863, "present". Records skip to July-August, 1864, "present". September-October, 1864, report "Absent on wounded furlough since 10 October 1864." November through February, 1865, indicate "present". There was no indication of how he was wounded nor any of the possible combat locations.

These records were located in the Greenville County Public Library. Perhaps duplicate microfilms are available in other county libraries. Even though the foregoing records are sketchy it is amazing to this writer that that many routine reports survived in the confusion and chaos that followed this tragic war.

So much of the emphasis on the "three" brothers has understandably prevailed through the years that the fourth brother - 1st Lt. Bennett J. Kinard - the youngest - who gave his life for the Confederate cause has been more often overlooked. It was gratifying to glean some facts of what happened to his widow and the one child that survived him. This information is included in the genealogy. Also appropriate pictures are included in the photo section of the book.

THE HENRY DOMINICK I FAMILY.

(c) HENRY DOMINICK I came to this Country, it is said, with two brothers, whose names are not known, one of the brothers stopping over in New York and the other going on to North Carolina or Tennessee. There are many Dominicks in New York, some of whom have attained great prominence in the financial world in that city.

Henry Dominick came to this Country from somewhere overseas. Tradition tells us that he was an Englishman, although born in Holland. The Annals of Newberry tells us that he settled in the "Dutch Fork" on Broad River, and that he was of German descent. He was born in 1757 or 1758 and died January 1, 1836.

Tradition says that he was about sixteen years old when he arrived in the United States with a party of settlers. He served as a private in the Colonial Armies during the Revolution, enlisting in the spring of 1779. He served under Lieutenant Thomas Miller. After returning home, he was taken prisoner by the British at Fort Granby, South Carolina, but, after two weeks' imprisonment, made his escape to the mountains. The Bureau of Pensions, Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C., states that Henry Dominick I made application for a pension November 14, 1832, his residence at the date of his application being Newberry District, S. C. The records of the Bureau of Pensions show that he was granted a pension of \$26.66 per annum, to commence March 4, 1831 (Certificate No. 5960, issued February 20, 1833).

Along with the settlers that came over at this time was Michael Fellers, who settled near where Colony Church now stands. Returning from the War, Henry Dominick I went to his home on Broad River, where for some years after the War, he continued to live as a bachelor, doing his own field and house work. One Saturday night, while he was cleaning and straightening up, Tradition says that he (Henry) said, "I must have me a wife and help-meet." So, suiting his actions to his words, he began to scrub and fix and primp as best he could, everything being wrong—for it takes the presence, love and help of one of the fairer sex to keep man in his place and happy.

So, putting on the best clothes he had, he went to the stable and bridled and saddled "Ball." ("Ball" was the horse off which he had killed a British General in the Revolutionary War, capturing the horse, bridle and saddle.) Mounting "Ball" at about twelve or one o'clock, he rode up to Michael Fellers' (the Michael Fellers spoken of above), getting there about sun-up and hailing. Mr. Fellers came out and invited him to "alight and come in." Henry then told Mr. Fellers his business—that he had come to see if he could get one of his girls for a wife. Mr. Fellers told him that he would have to go in and see the girl or girls about that. Henry got down and hitched "Ball" to the gate-post and went in. Mr. Fellers had seven daughters.

On entering, he found the seven daughters sitting around the fire. Mr. Fellers said: "Girls, Dominick has come to get one of you for his wife." Then, turning to Henry, he said: "Dominick, which one will you take?" Dominick said: "I will take Agnes." Fellers said: "Agnes, will you have him?" to which she answered, "Yes." So Dominick got her up behind him on "Ball," as people often rode double on horse-back in those days, and went down to Preacher Wallers, where they were married. They came back to Mr. Fellers' and ate breakfast. On Monday morning Mr. Fellers asked Dominick where he and his wife were going to live. Dominick said: "Down home on Broad River." Fellers said: "No, I will give you fifty acres of land down on Buffalo Creek and will sell you fifty acres for fifty cents an acre." So they decided on the Buffalo Place, four miles east of Prosperity, S. C.

To this union were born Henry II and Christiana. His wife, Agnes, died, and Henry I went back to Michael Fellers' and got Margaret for his second help-meet. To this union were born David, Andrew, Mary, Noah, George, Catherine and Frances.

THE HENRY DOMINICK II FAMILY.

(c) HENRY DOMINICK II, son of Henry Dominick I, was born April 30, 1787, growing to manhood and marrying Mary Paysinger. To this union were born twelve children: Frederick H., John, George, Elizabeth (who died before marriage), Catherine (who died before marriage), Mary, Nancy, Henry Wesley, Christiana, Eliza, Jacob (who died unmarried), and Andrew. He died April 18, 1865.

(c) NANCY DOMINICK, daughter of Henry Dominick II, married Drayton Kinard. To this union were born the following children: Michael, Henry, Luther, Burr, Lizzie (deceased).

(c) JOHN KINARD was born in 1850 and died in 1871. He was unmarried.

(c) NANCY KINARD was born in 1851 and died in 1871; unmarried.

(c) LIZZIE KINARD was born in 1853 and died in 1888. She married John Moore, and to this union were born the following children: Lila, Eleanor, Norma, Ethel and Nita.

(c) ELLEN KINARD was born in 1856. She married William Anderson, to which union were born the following: Hayne, Jefferson and Ellen.

(c) NANNIE KINARD, born in 1858, married Jos. Addison, and to this union were born three children, viz., Erin, Nita and Nannie.

(c) J. P. KINARD, born in 1858, married Lizelle Smiley. Their children were Jefferson, Quincy, Ben. Christiana, Marie and Michael, the two latter being twins.

(c) H. L. KINARD was born in 1863. He married Clara Arrington, and to this union were born the following: Bessie, Jefferson, Arrington and June.

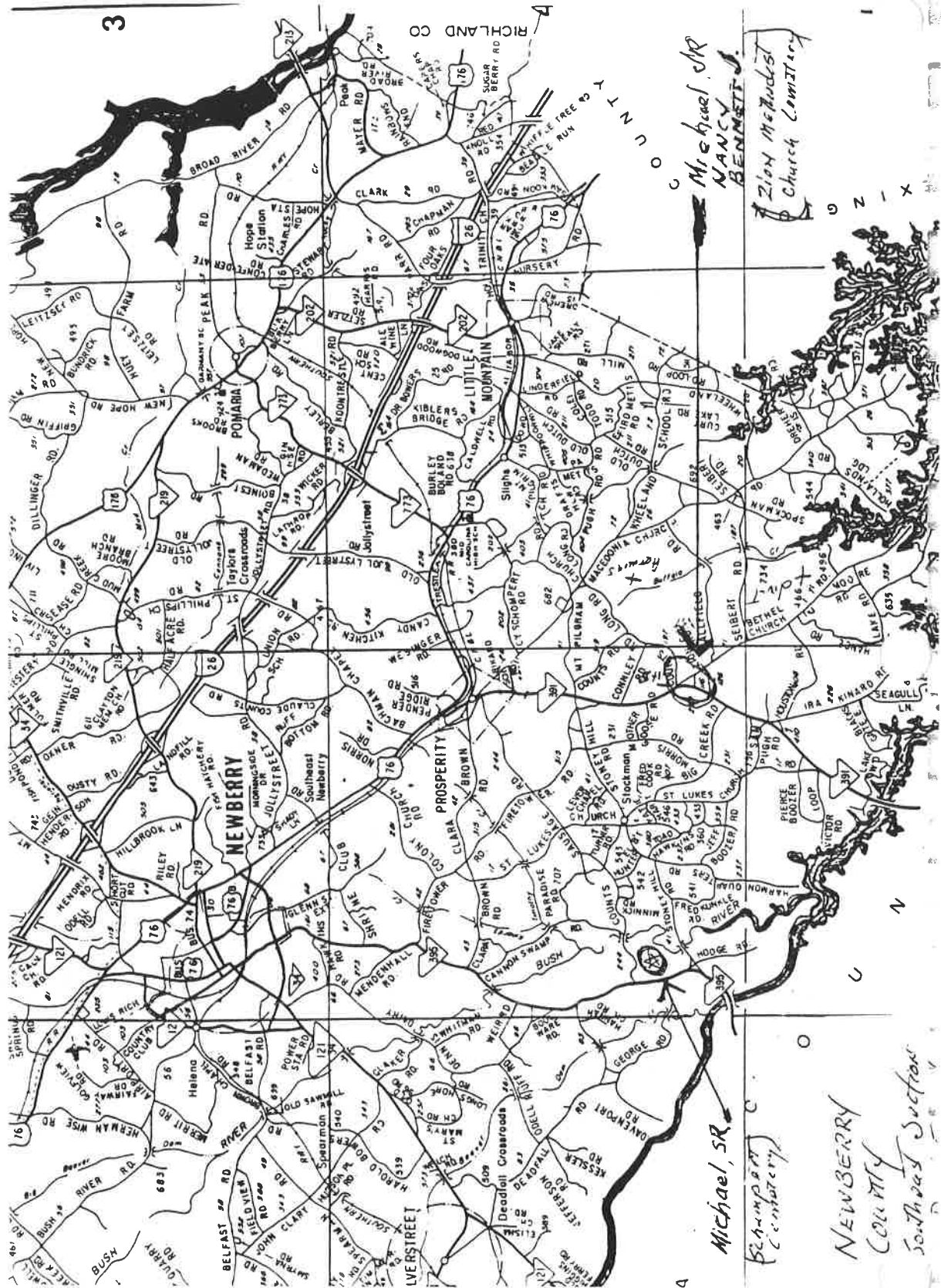
(c) B. L. KINARD, born in 1866, married Pauline Strother. To this union were born the following children: Louise, Mamie, Anne and Hayne.

THE HARMON FAMILY

JOHN LEONARD HARMON II, born September 9, 1773, died January 30, 1853, and is buried with his wife and son at "Old Harmon Church" at Beaver Creek in New Perry County. This church was formed during the early Methodist Revival in John Leonard Harmon's home and later a small church was built there. In 1808 it was moved to the Prosperity Road and called Zion Methodist Church and it still exists. He was married to Rachel Busby, daughter of Nathan Busby and granddaughter of William Busby who came from Virginia with his wife and ten children in 1742. The will of John Leonard Harmon was made April 23, 1849, Proven February 1, 1853, and is recorded at the Newberry County Court House. Most of this family went to Texas and Mississippi.

His children were: Margaret Harmon who married (1) William Leaphart and then (2) Reverend Godfrey Dreher; Keziah Harmon, who married William Lever; Elizabeth Harmon who married David Nunnemaker, son of Jacob Nunnemaker and Mary Ann Mathias, daughter of Jonas Mathias; Nancy Harmon who married Michael Kinard II and after his death in 1833 married (2) Colonel John Henry Stockman; Martha Jane Harmon, who married Peter Wesley Counts, son of John Henry Counts and Sarah Hair; Rachel Harmon who married Zachariah Connerly; Mary Harmon who married (1) Jacob Hawkins and then (2) George Morris; William Pierce Harmon who married (1) Elizabeth Hair and the (2) Caroline Hair and then (3) Kizziah Counts; John Wade Harmon, who married Sarah Lever, daughter of George and Mary Ann Chapman.

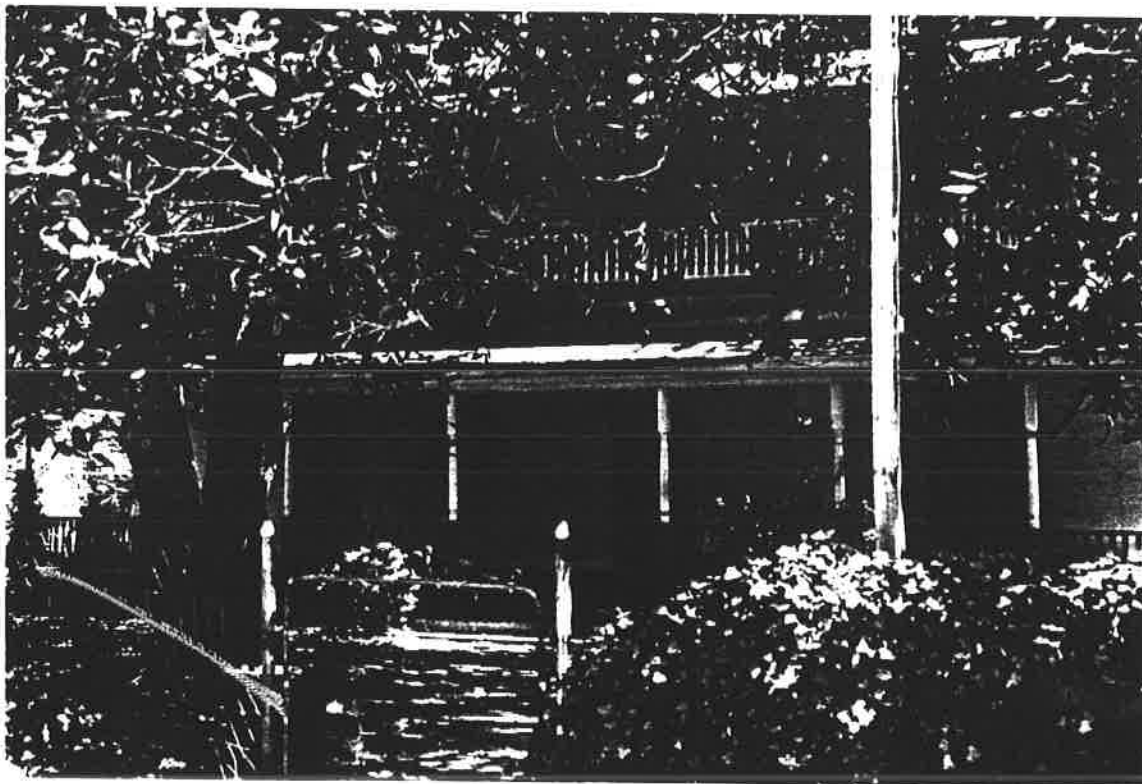

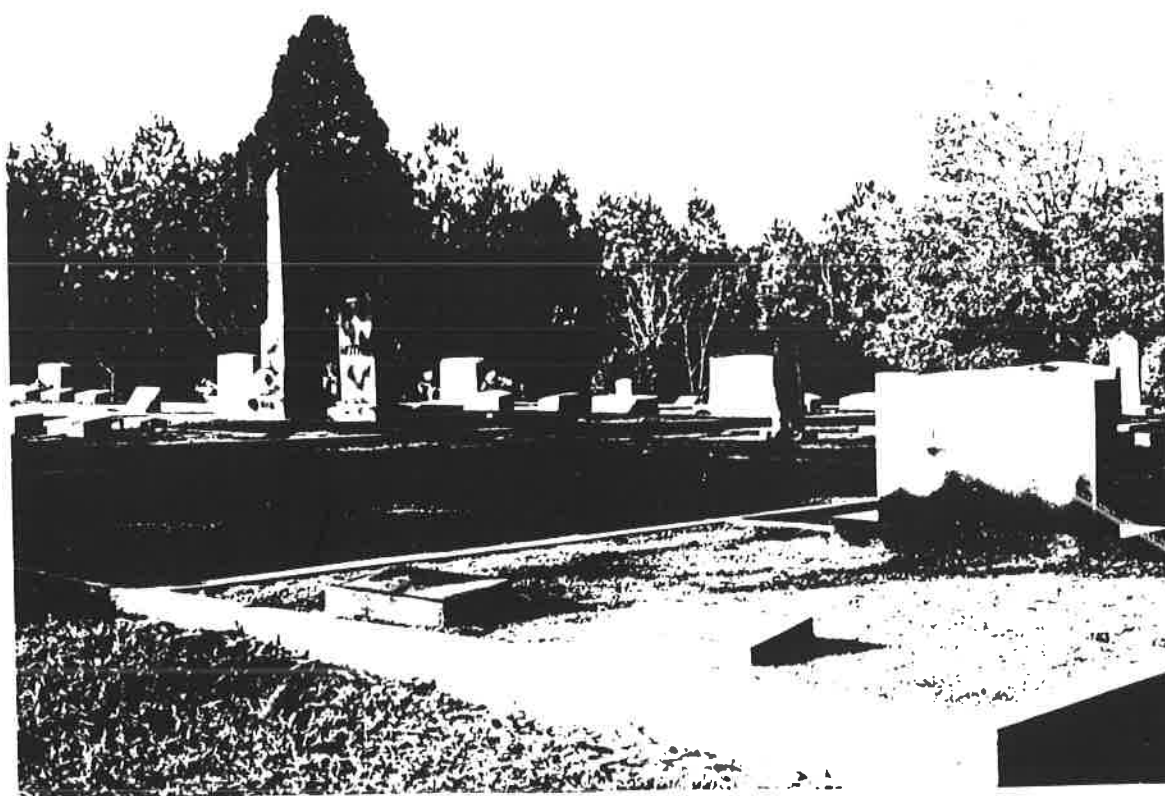

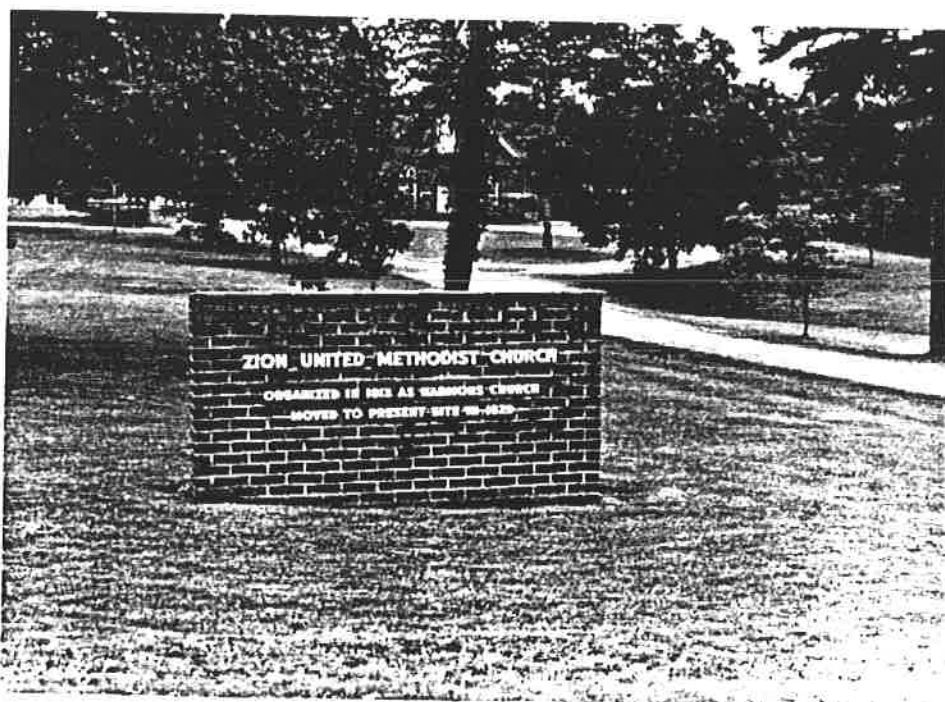

It should be noted that this section is being distributed only to the families descended from Drayton Tucker Kinard (F-1).

As an afterthought this section has been included in the book for all recipients. Other than the excellent article by James Henry Rice, details were lacking on two of the brothers, Jefferson McDuffie and Calvin Washington Kinard. Perhaps the inclusion of the personal information on Drayton Tucker Kinard adds something to the overall background of the family, and hopefully enhances one's appreciation of the entire Kinard clan.

DRAYTON TUCKER KINARD (6-4-1824 TO 11-4-1889)

Unfortunately there was not much information preserved from which to prepare a biographical sketch of this, the eldest son of Michael Kinard, Jr., and Nancy Harmon Kinard. Thanks to James Henry Rice's article (see pages 39-41), there is an interesting personal glimpse of Drayton.

Another valuable source of a brief article that was written just after Drayton's passing came from his granddaughter, Mrs. A. L. (Lillie) Kinard Johnson (of Henry Jefferson and Lillie M.) who preserved this bit of information in a composition notebook, two copies, one for her granddaughter, Jane Johnson (of Kinard and Margaret) and one for her grand niece, Dorothy Duncan (of Daniel T. and Mary Lillie). We are indebted to this source for the following article written by Rev. W. A. Betts, one time pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Church at Ninety Six:

Drayton Tucker Kinard (1824-1889)

Drayton Tucker Kinard, the son of Michael and Nancy Harmon Kinard of Newberry County, South Carolina, was born June 4, 1824, at the old homestead four miles to the southeast of Prosperity. He attended school near Zion Methodist Church, in the neighborhood where he was born. When he was only ten years old, his father died. Subsequently his mother married Henry Stockman. When he reached his majority, Brother Kinard was married to Miss Nancy Dominick, daughter of Henry and Mary Dominick of Newberry County. Sometime before the war, he joined the Methodist Church at Zion under the ministry of Rev. J. T. Kilgo. His wife united with the same church subsequently, she having been a Lutheran at the time of their marriage. In the latter part of 1866, with his brother Jefferson, he moved to a place three miles east of the old town of Cambridge in Greenwood County. Two years after, his brother Calvin Kinard moved into the same neighborhood. Upon reaching the section which was to be the place of their future abode, Brother Kinard and his family joined Salem Methodist Church about three miles away and in this church was for a long period an official member. When St. Paul's Church at Ninety Six (to which he contributed \$300 toward building) was organized, he and his family moved their membership there and from its pale (Salem Methodist Church) he passed to the church above (St. Paul's), 23rd of October, 1877. He was preceded to the better land by his good wife only about two years. The daughters of his

home died in early life.

Henry J. Kinard graduated from Wofford College (1873). Luther Kinard also completed half of the junior class at the same institution of learning. On the death of Brother Kinard (11-4-1889), his pastor Rev. W. P. Meadors wrote: "He was a successful farmer, and his means increased steadily, so that when he died he possessed a handsome property. He was a man of strong constitution, full of energy, industrious, economical, honest, truthful, temperate in all things, of a fine disposition, and liberal to all good and benevolent purposes. He seemed to take a special delight in spending his money for the church. For years he was a leading steward in the Methodist Church at Ninety Six and the largest contributor to the support of the ministry of the whole circuit. He was a modest man and of comparatively few words, but would often make most effectual and thrilling talks in love feasts. He was withal a good, earnest, conscientious Christian man, honored and highly esteemed by all who knew him. Gradually, calmly, resignedly he went down to death trusting the Lord."

James Henry Rice, Jr., wrote about the shotguns purchased by Drayton from W. C. Scott & Sons in England. One of the guns went to his son Henry J. and thence to his son Drayton Tucker ("D.T."). The gun was often used by D.T. and at various times by each of his four sons.

In fact, as a lad, I often used the gun, a 12 gauge double barrel breech loading hammer gun with especially good range. In my trips for small game I often killed birds beyond the range of guns used by the boys hunting with me. The metal sides of the gun that fit into the wooden stock were engraved with a scene of waterfowl swimming on a pond with rushes or cattails in the background. At the base of the barrel was a gold star apparently an identifying mark of the manufacturer.

Our gun went to brother Hubert thence to his son Bill who retains it as a family heirloom. Bill was offered \$1000 for the gun by a collector but refused the offer.

The second gun went to Drayton's son Burr and was passed to his son Dr. Jack Kinard and then to his nephew, William Hale Sherard (of Sophie of Burr). William, as his father, Hale, and his Kinard forebears, continues the sportsman tradition in the family.

The original home of Drayton Kinard was situated facing the Ninety Six Saluda Highway (S.C. #246) near the location and across the road from the Kinard Cemetery. Mrs. Joe (Bobbie Sherard) Jeter, granddaughter of Burr, lived as a child in the old homeplace and possesses a drawing of the house. A copy of this drawing has been reproduced in the photo section following the appendix section of The Kinard Family section of this book.

Family of G. "Poor Mike" Kinard

Because of the remarkable accomplishments of G. Michael Kinard and the ultimate demise of his entire line it would seem that special mention should be made of a few facts about him. He became widely known in Greenwood County because of the extent of his land holdings and the large and interesting house that he built for his family.

Tradition has it that "Poor Mike" engaged an architect from Ninety Six, a Mr. Frazier, who was responsible for the Mediterranean style of the house. In the late 1960's the house became the property of the Arden Traynham family, he - an architectural engineer who did extensive remodeling in a French Provincial style.

On March 21, 1989, the house burned. An account of this event and a picture of the house in its heyday appeared in the Greenwood Index Journal and is reproduced in this work.

Margaret Watson, author of Greenwood County Sketches has this to say about the original owner and builder of the old house: "Its builder was G. Mike Kinard (1857 - 1918), called "Poor Mike" to distinguish him from his first cousin J. M. C. ("Big Mike") Kinard. Belying his name, "Poor Mike" owned approximately 8,000 acres of land in the county."

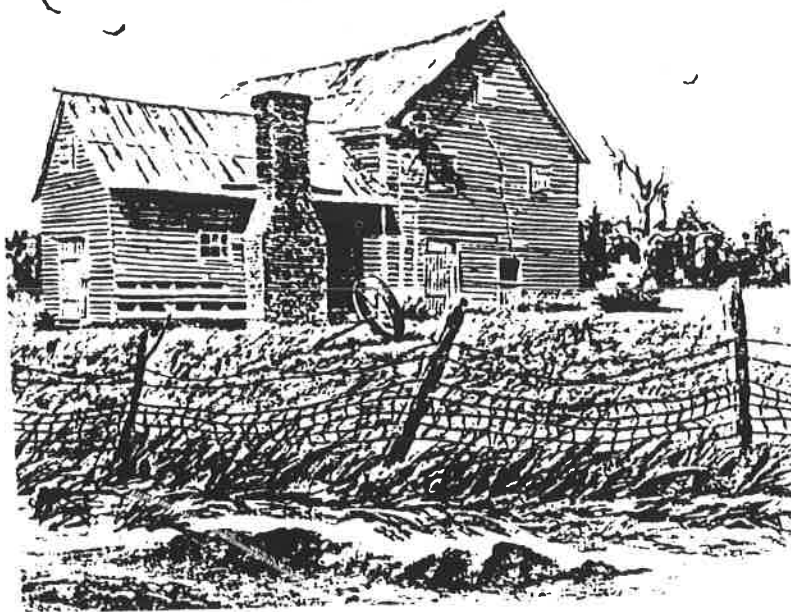
*Some estimates ran as much as 11,000 acres.

According to a family story, he worked on his father's farm at an annual wage of \$150 plus board and borrowed money at 12.5 per cent interest to buy his first parcel of land."

Another family story is that "Poor Mike" had ten sawmills going on his property to saw the lumber for his house. Also it was reported that he may have had as many as 100 "hands" working his farms.

The Kinards had one daughter, Mamie Lee, who died in 1925, having outlived her mother by some two years. The property went totally outside the family with Ira's death in 1936. One "adopted" daughter, Katie, was separately provided for by "Poor Mike" before his death. Katie was not legally adopted but could not have been more like their own child. She married Virgil Warner and lived happily until her death in 1992 at the age of 101.

A nondescript modern house now occupies the site.

Kinard House Burns

The George "Poor Mike" Kinard House, long a Greenwood landmark, burned early Monday morning, March 21st. The house was built by George "Poor Mike" Kinard (born July 13, 1847) who was a tall, thin man and very wealthy, despite his nickname. He died March 1, 1918.

The house, which was totally destroyed, was located on Highway 178 approximately 12 miles southeast of Greenwood. It was known locally as the old Traynham House, but known by present day family members as the old Mike Kinard House.

The house was built by "Poor Mike"

Kinard around 1870 and was remodeled around 1910. After the death of the Kinards, the house became the property of L.M. Dominick, their son-in-law.

Dominick married Kathleen Hart in 1927 and he died in 1936. The Kinard House contained a total of 21 rooms.

M. Kinard, B. B. Kinard, Lillie M. Kinard wife of H. J. Kinard and Julia V. Kinard wife of C. L. Kinard.

Item 3rd I wish my Executors to divide my real estate by sale or by allotment into four shares equally between G. M. Kinard, B. B. Kinard, Lillie M. Kinard wife of H. J. Kinard and Julia V. Kinard the wife of C. L. Kinard and whether by allotment or sale they are hereby as my Executors authorized and fully empowered to execute deeds of conveyance to the same or any part thereof.

Item 4 I hereby declare constitute and appoint my four sons G. M. Kinard, H. J. Kinard, C. L. Kinard and B. B. Kinard or their survivors as my sole Executors for carrying out and performing the conditions and purposes of this my last will and testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto fixed my hand and seal, this 8th November, One
Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty Nine - and 114th year of American Independence.

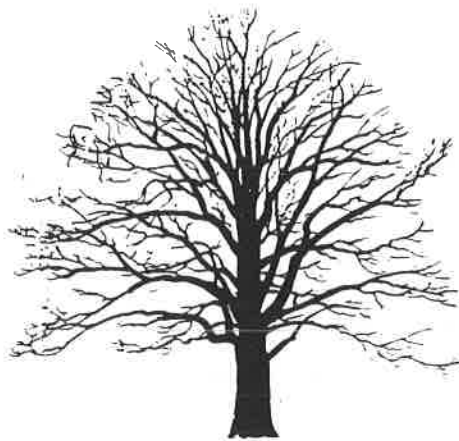

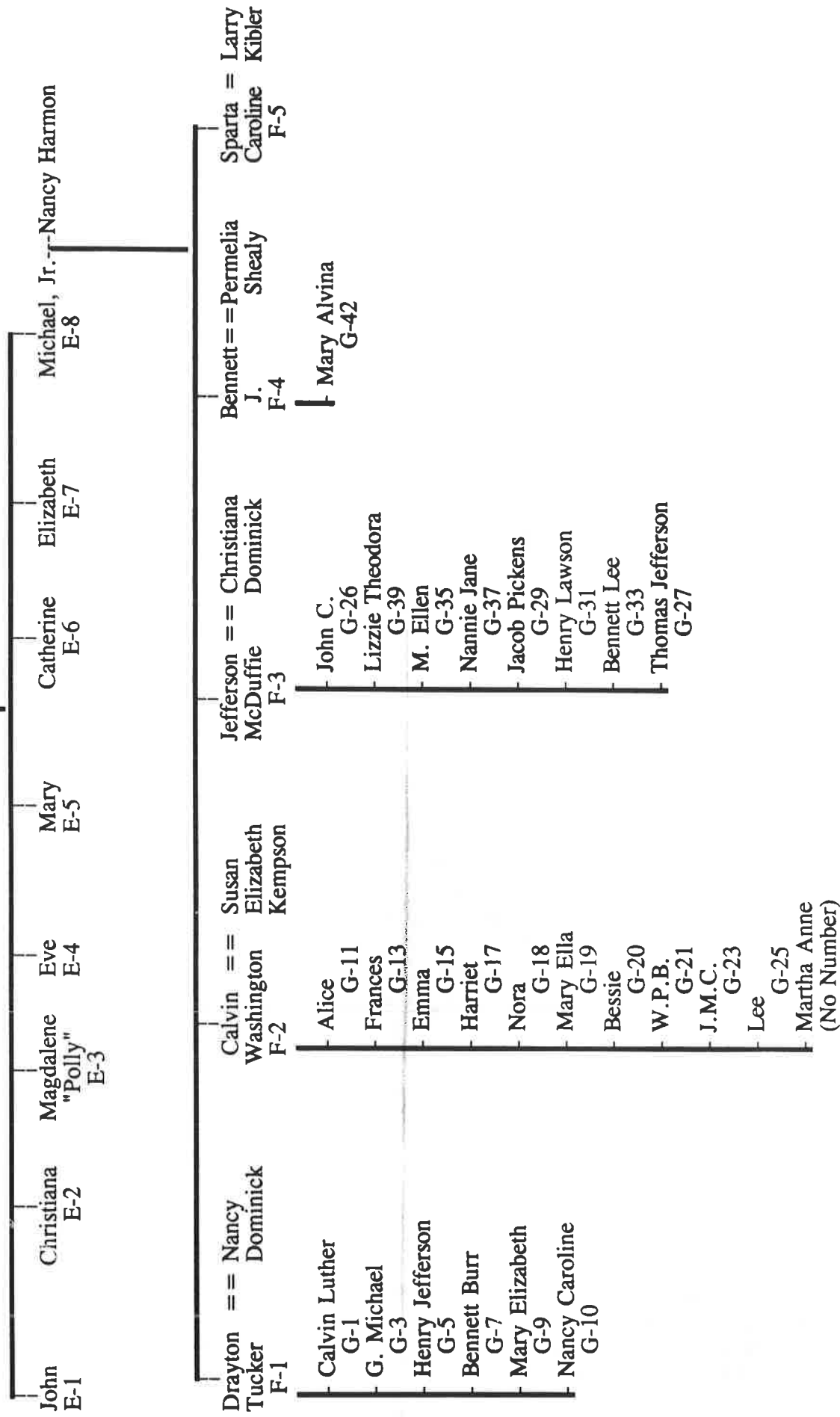

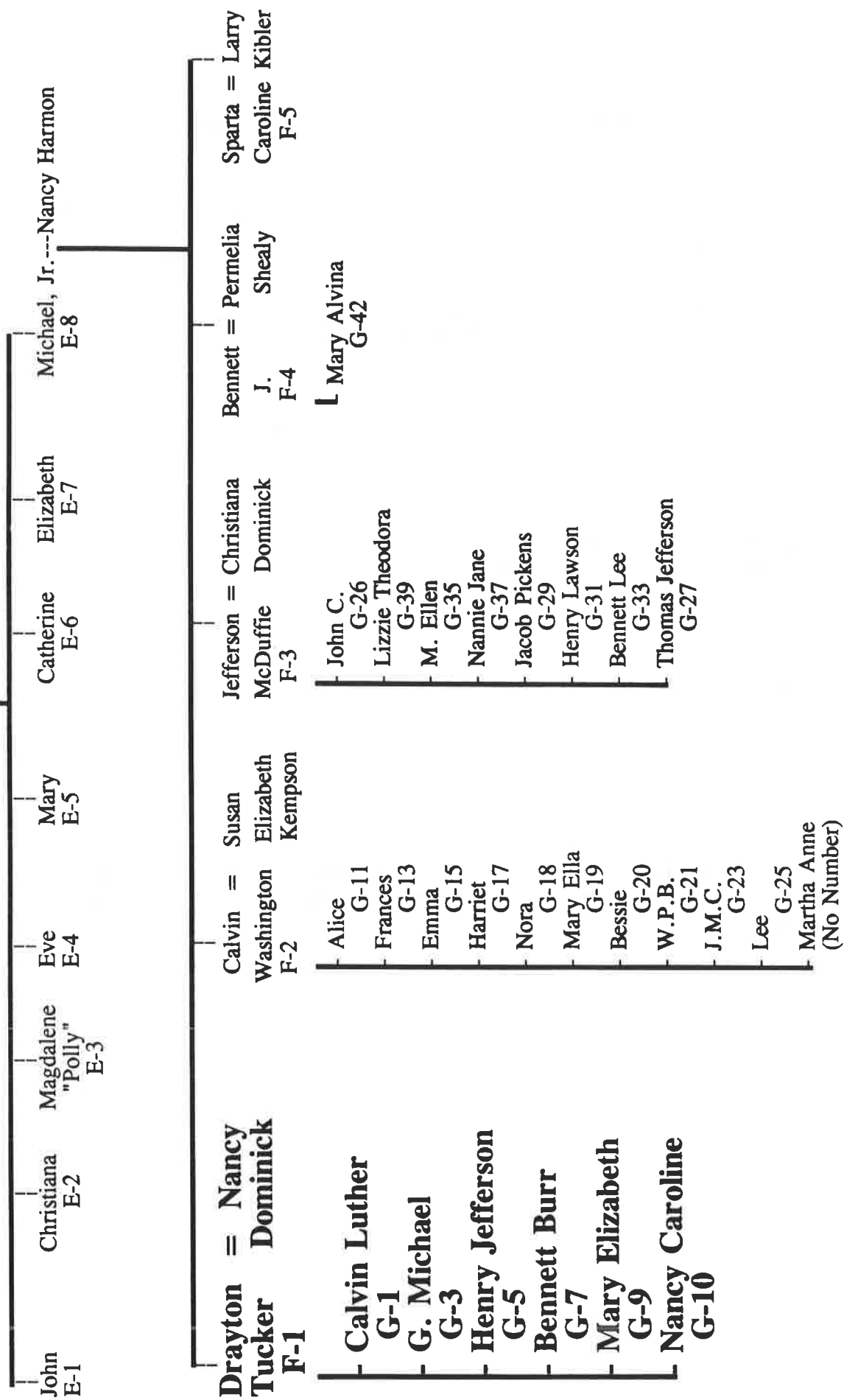
