# A Guide to Presbyterian Ecclesiastical Names and Places In South Carolina 1685-1985

Joseph B. Martin III\*

#### Introduction

Presbyterians in South Carolina have gathered together in nearly a thousand churches in the three centuries since 1685, when Rev. Thomas Barret, "a Dissenter and probably a Presbyterian," was first recorded at work in the colony. The records of these churches represent an invaluable resource for the study of the ecclesiastical, genealogical, and social history of the state.

Research in these materials is hampered, however, by their dispersal through hundreds of churches, successor churches, higher courts of the church, university and local libraries, private societies, and museums. Worse yet, there is no uniform method of cataloguing such materials or even of referring to the churches from which they come.

A church may be recorded under a name that has been changed, under a presbytery with which it is no longer affiliated, quite frequently under a rural post office address that is no longer valid (often no longer existing), under the county in which it was located at the time the records were received, or perhaps by a location long since abandoned. Information about churches serving several communities is sometimes filed under the post office address of the church member or minister supplying the information. Informal references in diaries and letters and even more formal references in deeds and reports often identify churches only by some river, roadway, or landmark or by some transitory community name.

The confusion is compounded by the similarity of many church names and many locations. The researcher will find materials of several churches merged in a single file under a common name or material from

a single church filed as several separate churches — or even two different histories of the same church under two different names in the same volume of church history.<sup>2</sup>

This difficulty is not just a twentieth-century phenomenon. In his remarkable history of the church in South Carolina to 1850, Dr. George Howe recorded the frustration of the erudite Dr. Thomas Reese over "the confusion of names which is so baffling to one who tries to understand the records of the past." Dr. Reese's lament was written in 1793 about frontier churches that flourished in the previous decade!

The problem becomes greater with the accumulation of decades and centuries. With no systematic method of identification, materials are easily misunderstood, often overlooked, and sometimes lost.

The archivist faces as difficult a task as the researcher, for the question of whether material is significant or merely duplicative is as troublesome as the questions of where to keep it and how to record it. With the formation of a dozen of more branches of Presbyterianism in the state at one time or another — some enduring, some brief, and all with intermingled membership — the historical tracks of particular Presbyterian churches are scattered through the annual Minutes of nearly forty presbyteries in a dozen or so denominational General Assemblies and more than a thousand volumes of official records and histories. The accurate identification of the records of a church with a complex history, or an obscure one, is no easy matter.

Finally, without the means of an accurate and comprehensive inventory, important documents can be lost long before they are missed, and related documents that could provide contextual significance for each other may never be matched together.

### Organization of the Guide

This "Guide to Presbyterian Ecclesiastical Names and Places" avoids the impractical task of suggesting a single cataloguing system for historical materials. Rather, it is an attempt to aid archivist and researcher by providing the means of accurately identifying a church for which materials are to be recorded and of locating materials, however they have been catalogued.

Church names and locations, along with variant names and locations, are alphabetized and cross-referenced to a principal entry for each Presbyterian or Reformed church known to have been organized in the state since the beginning of the colony. Information on the date of founding,

presbytery affiliations, counties and districts, and variant names and locations by which information may be found is given for each principal entry. Histories of the church are also indicated, where available.

#### **Founding Dates**

Founding dates are often debatable. In his History of the Presbyterian Church in South Carolina, Dr. Howe wrote, "One great source of confusion ... is the different ecclesiastical organizations, springing up sometimes contemporaneously, more often successively in the same general community, the dates of which as organizations are made coeval with the settlement itself. Religious people occupying a new country worship God in their households first, then in social assemblies of limited numbers, eventually in ecclesiastical organizations, and these not always permanent, but one giving place to another as population extends itself in different directions and families move from their original seats." (I:299) Founding dates indicated in this Guide are, insofar as possible, the dates of organization as a Presbyterian church affiliated with a presbytery and are taken from presbytery minutes. For independent churches, Presbyterian churches organized before presbytery organizations or before extant presbytery records, and for churches well established before affiliation with a presbytery, founding dates are accepted from such sources as denominational or local church histories. In such cases, dates of affiliation with presbyteries are also indicated.

#### **Presbytery Affiliations**

Presbytery affiliations are also sometimes unclear, especially during the colonial years and other times for which records are missing or sketchy. In such cases, this Guide lists the presbytery for an entire period if either the church or its minister was listed as a member during the period and there is no indication of a separation from the presbytery during that time. There is no intent to claim presbytery membership for the church in question during that time, but rather to suggest that information relative to the church may more likely be found with information about that presbytery than with some other.

Information on presbyteries, synods, and General Assemblies (and other associations) is given under the alphabetical heading for each court. General information may be found under the first listing for "General Assemblies," "Presbyteries," and "Synods."

#### Variant Names and Locations

"Variants" are names or places under which historical data may be found, even if they are erroneous references and are not necessarily actual or accurate changes in the church name or location. Actual changes are indicated.

Library Holdings

The Historical Foundation of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches (renamed The Presbyterian Study Center in 1988) at Montreat was established in 1927 to collect and preserve the materials of the churches of the Presbyterian order in America, with emphasis on churches in the South and Southwest in the several denominations of the Reformed tradition. It was the official repository for documents of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, the largest Presbyterian denomination in South Carolina. The South Caroliniana Library in Columbia also has extensive holdings of churches throughout the state. Other library and local church holdings (including those of the South Carolina Historical Society) are noted in this Guide only if the item cannot be found in Montreat or the South Caroliniana Library. (Each active denomination has official archives that may contain local church histories and may be located through any church in that denomination.)

Identification of items held by local libraries and museums is drawn from *Research Materials in South Carolina*, by John Hammond Moore (Columbia: U.S.C. Press, 1967) and from *Local and Family History in South Carolina: A Bibliography*, by Richard N. Coté (Easley, S.C.: Southern Historical Press, 1981). These are invaluable resources for the use of historical collections in South Carolina, but the researcher will encounter in both listings the confusion among congregations and places that characterizes descriptions of the historical materials of Presbyterian churches. Reasonable variants in their lists and indices have been accommodated in the variant names included in this Guide, but actual errors and omissions have not been explicitly noted.

Searching for Historical Records

Since the purpose of this Guide is limited to the accurate identification of particular churches, explicit reference is made only to authoritative historical accounts of the churches. Official church records and other research resources, although not listed, may be located through use of the Guide.

A comprehensive search of historical materials should include (for all variant names listed in this Guide for any given church): local Session Minutes and Registers; congregational records; local and family histories (see Coté, Local and Family History, already cited); biographies and collections of personal papers (of ministers, for example, or of active church members and leaders); minutes and records of church courts beyond the particular church (Richard N. Coté, "South Carolina Presbyterian Records," South Carolina Historical Magazine, vol. 85 (1984), pp. 145-152, is a general guide, and official records may be located through the office of the Stated Clerk of any surviving presbytery, synod or General Assembly); maps—the authoritative source is W. P. Cumming, The Southeast in Early Maps

(Princeton: Princeton University Press, 1958), but see Robert Mills, Atlas of the State of South Carolina (1825, reprinted 1980 by the Southern Historical Press, Easley, S.C.) for early waterways and place names; church buildings and other facilities often illustrated or described in the WPA archive surveys and in local church histories (for 35mm slide transparencies of all churches in the Synod of South Carolina c.1960-1970, see Arthur Martin's collection at Montreat); historic artifacts such as communion tokens, pews, memorial tablets, and pulpits; photographs of individuals, groups, church activities (see extensive collection at Montreat and at most churches); cemetery rosters; notices in church and secular newspapers and journals.

#### **Errors**

Errors of fact and of confusion undoubtedly remain in the Guide. It may well be that great diligence has resulted only in their being gathered together in one place — where, at least, they will be more vulnerable to attack and may attract corrections or clarifications to the South Carolina Historical Society for future notice.

# Denominational Affiliations Included in the Guide

The Reformed tradition in South Carolina may be found in a number of ecclesiastical bodies not included in this Guide. Those included are those officially related to a Presbyterian court or (as in the case of the Corpus Evangelicum, for example) an independent presbyterial association and those composed primarily (as in the case of the Congregational Association of South Carolina) of churches that were at one time or another affiliated with a Presbyterian court. As an example of the principle, the Independent Presbyterian Church of 1813-1863 meets both criteria as a presbyterial association of churches formerly affiliated with the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America and subsequently with the Presbyterian Church in the United States; it is included. Congregations unaffiliated with any other congregations at any time in any presbyterial jurisdiction (even if organized by individual Presbyterians or former Presbyterians, as in a number of twentieth-century "independent Presbyterian churches") are not included. Black Congregational churches organized in the late-nineteenth century by former Presbyterians are also not included, the Congregational Church in the United States being a distinctly separate denomination by that time. ABBEVILLE. ABBEVILLE PRESBYTERY. Black churches in the Abbeville area formed this independent presbytery c.1879. Joined 1898 with other presbyteries to form The Synod of the Colored Presbyterian Church of the United States and Canada (renamed 1899 as the Afro-American Presbyterian Church). Probably merged into North and South Carolina Presbytery before 1916. Variant name: Abbeville Independent Colored Presbytery. History: E. T. Thompson, Presbyterians in the South (Richmond, Va.: John Knox Press, 1973), esp. II: 308-331: Iones and Mills (270ff.).

ABBEVILLE SECOND PRESBY-TERIAN CHURCH. See Washington Street Presbyterian Church, Abbeville.

ABBEVILLE THIRD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ABBEVILLE, S.C. Founded 1895. Apparently extinct by 1916. Presbytery: South Carolina 1895-1897, Abbeville Independent Colored Presbytery thereafter. County: Abbeville. History: Jones and Mills (269-270, 272).

ACADEMIES. See Schools and Colleges.

ADAM'S RUN CHURCH. See Wilton Presbyterian Church; also see Calvary and Faith Presbyterian Churches with Adam's Run locations.

ADGERCOLLEGE, WALHALLA, S.C. Founded 1877 as successor to Newberry College (which had been resident in Walhalla 1868-1877). Abandoned 1889. History: Jones and Mills (363-365).

AFRICAN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. A policy objective, never achieved, of General Assemblies in the Presbyterian Church in the United States after the Civil War. Variant references: Independent Colored Presbyterian Church, Negro Presbyterian Church. (See Afro-American Synod, especially reference to Thompson's history.)

AFRO-AMERICAN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. Organized 1898 by independent presbyteries of Abbeville, Chester, North and South Carolina, Ethel, Central Alabama, and Texas as the Synod of the Colored Presbyterian Church of the United States and Canada, renamed 1899 the Afro-American Presbyterian Church. At the time of its incorporation into the Presbyterian

Church in the United States in 1916 as the Afro-American Synod (renamed 1917 Snedecor Memorial Synod), only the North and South Carolina Presbytery remained. History: E. T. Thompson, *Presbyterians in the South* (Richmond, Va.: John Knox Press, 1973), II: 308-331, esp. 327; III: 88ff.

AFRO-AMERICAN SYNOD. Successor to the Afro-American Presbyterian Church. Formed 1916 with the North and South Carolina Presbytery, a newly organized Central Louisiana Presbytery, and the presbyteries of Ethel (Miss.) and Central Alabama which had remained an organic part of the Presbyterian Church in the United States. The synod was renamed Snedecor Memorial Synod in 1917. (See Snedecor Memorial Synod). General Assembly: Presbyterian Church in the United States. ARSENAL HILL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ASSOCIATE REFORMED. COLUMBIA, S.C. Founded 1886 as Second Presbyterian Church. Name changed to Arsenal Hill Presbyterian Church 1907. Presbytery: Charleston 1886-1914, Congaree 1914-1983, Catawba 1983-present. County: Richland 1886-present. Variant name: Columbia Second 1886-1907. ASHEPOO RIVER CHURCH. See Bethel Presbyterian Church, Walterboro.

ASHLEY RIVER . . . CHURCH. An unidentified congregation served by Rev. Thomas Barret about 1685. See Howe I:70, 122; also, Charles A. Hanna, The Scotch-Irish (New York: G. P. Putnam's Sons, 1902), vol. 2, p. 115ff., lists a Presbyterian congregation on the Ashley "before 1684." (Also see Midway Congregation and also Summerville Presbyterian Church, successor to Dorchester Church on the Ashley River.)

ASSOCIATE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. A small minority branch of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, dating from the 1782 union forming the Associate Reformed Synod, with historical and theological antece-

dents to Scotland's Associate Presbytery. (Also see Associate Presbytery of the Carolinas.)

ASSOCIATE PRESBYTERY. An independent presbytery in Scotland with antecedents in the Church of Scotland, it had affiliations with numerous churches and ministers in South Carolina prior to the organization of colonial presbyteries. Although its affiliated churches in South Carolina differed from Covenanter churches affiliated with the Reformed Presbytery in Scotland, both branches for the most part gradually gravitated to a mutual association in the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. Some Associate and Reformed churches also withdrew together from the Associate Reformed Synod of the Carolinas in 1803 to form the Associate Presbytery of the Carolinas. Variant names: Seceders. Secession Church, Associate Societies. History: Lathan (119-145).

ASSOCIATE PRESBYTERY OF THE CAROLINAS. Organized 1803 by disaffected ministers in the Second Presbytery (A.R.P.); reunited 1844 with the Associate Reformed Synod of the Carolinas. General Assembly: Associate Presbyterian Church. History: Lathan (296-309ff.).

ASSOCIATE REFORMED PRESBY-TERIAN CHURCH. Organized 1782 as Associate Reformed Synod, uniting churches related to the Associate and Reformed Presbyteries in Scotland (and to the Associate and Reformed Presbyteries organized in Pennsylvania in 1753 and 1774); re-organized 1804 as the General Synod, with the Associate Reformed Synod of the Carolinas (organized 1803 at the Brick Church, Fairfield County) and three other synods outside the Carolinas. The Synod

of the Carolinas withdrew 1822, forming a separate denomination as the Associate Reformed Synod of the South; renamed 1912 as The Associate Reformed Synod; renamed 1935 as the General Synod of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. ASSOCIATE REFORMED PRESBY-TERY OF THE CAROLINAS AND GEORGIA. Organized 1790 as a presbytery of the Associate Reformed Synod. Divided 1800 into First Presbytery (east of the Broad River) and Second Presbytery (west of the Broad) — Centennial notes boundary exceptions (14-19), and Lathan notes an additional exception (291). History: Lathan (187ff., 285ff.). (See Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church and entries for First and Second Presbyteries.)

ASSOCIATE REFORMED SYNOD. See Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church.

ASSOCIATE SOCIETIES. See Associate Presbytery.

ATLANTIC PRESBYTERY (1868-1988). Black Presbyterian churches in South

Carolina organized this presbytery after the Civil War (along with Catawba Presbytery and later Fairfield Presbytery). Succeeded 1988 by Charleston-Atlantic and New Harmony Presbyteries (see separate entries). Boundaries: Seaboard South Carolina (plus Wilmington, NC, area initially). Churches in Sumter, Lee, and Clarendon Counties transferred 1888 to Fairfield Presbytery, received again 1959 from Fairfield; Allendale and Barnwell transferred 1921 to McClelland. Synod: Atlantic until renamed 1967, South Carolina-Georgia 1967-1973, South 1973-1988. General Assembly: Presbyterian Church in the United States of America to 1957, United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America 1957-1983, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) 1983-1988.

ATLANTICSYNOD (1868-1967). Black Presbyterian churches in the Carolinas, Georgia, and Florida organized this synod after the Civil War. North Carolina transferred 1887 to Synod of Catawba; Florida transferred 1906 to Synod of Alabama. Presbyteries with churches in South Carolina (see separate entries in this Guide: Atlantic, Catawba (primarily North Carolina). Fairfield, Knox-Hodge (primarily Georgia), McClelland. Renamed 1967 Synod of South Carolina-Georgia; merged into Synod of the South 1973. General Assembly: Presbyterian Church in the United States of America to 1957; United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America 1957-1967.

AUGUSTA STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, GREENVILLE, S.C. Founded 1940. Presbytery: Carolina 1945-1961, Southeast 1961-1982, Calvary 1982-present. County: Greenville 1940-present. Variant name: Greenville Bible Presbyterian Church (1945).

History: brief history in 1969 Directory (at Montreat).

AUGUSTA STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, WEST COLUMBIA, S.C. Founded 1965 in the former West Columbia (Brookland) Presbyterian Church building by former members of that church. Fellowship of Independent Evangelical Churches (not a Presbyterian church). The denominational identification was dropped from the church name c.1980. History: brief history of the congregation by H. W. Von Nessen ("God's Hand Through 75 Years," dated from beginning of Brookland Presbyterian Church), undated, 18 pp. (at Montreat).






FRASIER EXCELSIOR SCHOOL, BAMBERG, S.C. A school sponsored by the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America 1916-c.1930. County: Bamberg. History: Parker (186).

FREDERICIAN CHURCH, CATTLE CREEK, S.C. Flourished c.1780 as a Swiss and German Protestant church, sometimes called Presbyterian, perhaps with antecedents to c.1735. Presbytery: Charleston 1738-1780?; member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788. Probably Methodist by c.1800. County: St. Matthew's Parish to 1770, Orangeburgh District after 1770 (modern Orangeburg County). Variant name: Cattle('s) Creek, Cattel's Creek (which flows into the Edisto River). Variant location reference: North Edisto River. History: Howe (I:216-217, 494); Lutheran History (97, 103, 109ff., 128ff.); G. D. Bernheim, History of the German Settlements and of the Lutheran Church in North

FRENCH PROTESTANT (HUGUE-NOT) CHURCH OF NEW BOUR-DEAUX, HILLSBORO, S.C. Founded 1764. Absorbed by Church of England c.1780, with some memberstransferred to Hopewell Presbyterian Church, Abbeville. Reconstituted as French Presbyterian Church c.1797-1813 with the name of Liberty Meeting House or

Moriah Church; succeeded 1813 by Willington Presbyterian Church. County: Ninety-Six District (modern McCormick County). Variant name: Liberty Meeting House, Bourdeaux Huguenots. Variant location references: Long Cane Creek (which flows into Little River and then into the Savannah River), Little River. FRENCH PROTESTANT (HUGUE-NOT) CHURCH OF PORT ROYAL. See Port Royal Colony.

FRENCH PROTESTANT (HUGUE-NOT) CHURCH OF PURRYSBURG, S.C. A congregation of French-Swiss people affiliated with the Church of England, never an organized Hugue-not church. County: Beaufort District. Variant name: French congregation at Purrysburg. Variant location reference: Savannah River. History: Hirsch (28-33, 64, 81-84).

FRENCH PROTESTANT (HUGUE-NOT) CHURCH OF SANTEE, JAMESTOWN, S.C. Founded 1686. Transferred 1706 to the Church of England, seven months before the Church Act of 1706. County: Berkeley? (Proprietary) (modern Berkeley or Williamsburg County). Variant name: Santee Church. Variant location references: Santee River, French Jamestown, French Santee. FRENCH PROTESTANT (HUGUENOT) CHURCH OF ST. JOHN'S BERKELEY. Founded c.1700. Absorbed into the Church of England 1706. Sporadic presbyterial affiliations until the Revolution. County: Berkeley (Proprietary) (modern Berkeley County). Variant location references: Simpson's Basin, Santee Canal, CooperRiver (West Branch). History: Howe (I:112, 151-152, 169-170); Hirsch (23-26, 47-50, 79-84).

FRENCH QUARTER CREEK CHURCH. See French Protestant Huguenot Church of Orange Quarter.

FRIENDFIELD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, GEORGETOWN, S.C. Founded 1953. Presbytery: Harmony 1953-1988, New Harmony 1988-present. County: Georgetown 1953-present. History: brief history in *A Celebration of Harmony Presbytery* (Columbia, S.C.: R.L.Bryan Co., 1985), p. 10; annual history updates (from 1955-) (at Montreat).

FRIENDSHIP PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, LAURENS, S.C. Founded 1820 in a Union Church with Methodists and Baptists. Probably successor to Rabourn's Creek Presbyterian Church. Presbytery: South Carolina 1820-1878, Enoree 1878-1914, South Carolina 1914-1973, Calvary 1973-present. County: Laurens (District 1820-1868, County 1868-present). Variant location references: Rabourn's Creek

and Reedy River (which flows into the Saluda River), Tumbling Shoals, Simpson's Mills, Gray Court. History: Howe (II:377-378, 535, 710); Jones and Mills (1000-1002); Virginia M. FRIERSON CONGREGATION, KING-STREE, S.C. Members of Bethel Presbyterian Church, Kingstree, who migrated to Tennessee c.1805 (see Howe II:64-71).

FULTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, GREER, S.C. Founded 1900. Presbytery: Enoree 1900-1973, Calvary 1973-present. County: Spartanburg 1900-present. Variant name: Iconium Sunday School (prior to 1900). History: Jones and Mills (710-716); annual history updates (1961-1973) (at Montreat).

GABLE. See Congruity Presbyterian Church.

GADSDEN. See Richland Presbyterian Church, Eastover.

GAFFNEY. In addition to the entry under this name, also see Beech Street, Limestone, and Salem churches.

Affiliated with Coulter Memorial Academy (1881-1948), Laney Mission, Powe Mission and McDonald Mission sponsored by the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (see separate entries). Coulter Academy continued as Long High School, a public school (with Presbyterian Church participation to 1955). Church name changed 1984 to George Waldo Long Memorial. Presbytery: Catawba 1881-1884, Fairfield 1885-1959, Fairfield-McClelland 1959-1988, New Harmony 1988-present. County: Chesterfield 1881-present. History: Parker (161-167); WPA Archive Survey.

GEORGIA AND SOUTH CAROLINA, SYNOD OF. See South Carolina and Georgia Synod.

GEORGIA-CAROLINA PRESBYTERY (1951-1968). Black churches in Georgia and the Carolinas affiliated with the Presbyterian Church in the United States organized this presbytery in 1951. Carolina churches were previously affiliated with North and South Carolina Presbytery in Snedecor Synod. From 1952 to 1968, these churches in South Carolina were recorded in Georgia Synod. Georgia churches transferred 1968 to other existing presbyteries in Georgia; remaining South Carolina churches transferred 1968 to Synod of South Carolina as Carolina Presbytery (and subsequently transferred to existing presbyteries in South Caro-Synod: Georgia 1951-1968. General Assembly: Presbyterian Church in the United States. See Carolina Presbytery and also North and South Carolina Presbytery.

GEORGIA SYNOD. Separated 1845 from Synod of South Carolina and Georgia with Georgia churches formerly in that synod. In 1951, Georgia-Carolina Presbytery, including churches in South Carolina, was organized in Georgia Synod and received South Carolina churches formerly in North and South Carolina Presbytery in Snedecor Synod. Black Presbyterian churches in South Carolina that were affiliated with the Presbyterian Church in the United States are reported in General Assembly records as members of Georgia-Carolina Presbytery in Georgia Synod from 1952-1968. Established a chapel in 1793 that became St. Stephens Church, Piney Woods (see separate Not a member of Corpus Evangelicum, Lutheran by 1820s. Data often confused with St. John on the Four-Hole. County: Ninety-Six District, Lexington County. Variant names: St. John's Pomaria, White Church. Variant location reference: fork of Broad and Saluda Rivers, Crim's Creek (which flows into the Broad River). History: Lutheran History (144, 147, 711-713); G. D. Bernheim, History of the German Settlements and of the Lutheran Church in North and South Carolina (Philadelphia, Pa.: The Lutheran Book Store, 1872), p. 309; Paul Quattlebaum, "Some German Protestants in South Carolina in 1794," South Carolina Historical and Genealogical Magazine (vol. 51, 1950), pp. 75-77.

GERMAN CALVINISTIC CHURCH OF ST. JOHN ON THE FOUR-HOLE, ORANGEBURG, S.C. Founded c.1788. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Probably Methodist by c.1800. Data often confused with St. John's Pomaria. County: Orangeburg District. Variant location references: Fourhole Swamp or Four Hole Creek (which flows into the Edisto River). History: Lutheran History (106ff., 130-131); G. D. Bernheim, History of the German Settlements and of the Lutheran Church in North and South Carolina (Philadelphia, Pa.: The Lutheran Book Store, 1872), pp. 309-310.

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF BETHEL, WHITE ROCK, S.C. Founded

1762. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Lutheran after 1814. County: Orangeburgh District to 1804, Lexington (County 1785-1791, District 1804-1868, County 1868-present). Variant names: Bethel White Rock, High Hill Creek, Protestant Society of Bethel Church. Variant location reference: High Hill Creek (which flows into the Saluda River). History: Lutheran History (106ff., 137, 565-568).

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF BETHLEHEM, FAUST'S FORD, IRMO, S.C. Founded 1770? Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Lutheran after c.1820. County: Orangeburgh District 1770?-1804, Lexington (County 1785-1791, District after 1804). Variant names: Bethlehem Church (before 1788) or Bethlehem Black Creek (which flows into the North Edisto River); also Ellisor's Church, Bookman's Church. Variant location references: Fust's Ford, Foustsford, Forest's Ford.

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF (MT.) ZION, LEXINGTON COUNTY, S.C. Founded 1745?, with services dating from 1735. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Lutheran after 1803. County: Orangeburgh District before 1803, Lexington County 1785-1791. Variant location references: Younginer's Ferry, Saluda River.

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF ST. GEORGE, HARD LABOUR CREEK, ABBEVILLE COUNTY, S.C. Founded 1769. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788(see separate entry). Possibly Methodist by c.1800. Extinct by 1811. County: Ninety-Six District 1769-1799, Abbeville (County 1785-1799, District 1800-c.1811). Variant name: Queen Charlotte often appears

as a variant name for St. George Church but is more properly listed as a separate church. (See German Protestant Church of Queen Charlotte.) Variant location references: Londonburgh Township, (Hard Labour Creek flows into Stevens Creek and then into the Savannah River). (See also German Protestant Church of St. George.) County: Ninety-Six District until 1799, Newberry (County 1785-1799, District after 1800). Variant names: St. Jacob's on Wateree Creek, Protestant Society at Wateree Variant location references: Creek. Wateree Creek (which flows into the Broad River), erroneously as Orangeburgh District. History: Lutheran History (106ff., 144-145, 685-687).

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF ST. MARTIN, WHITE ROCK, S.C. Unknown dates and place (probably along Saluda River between White Rock and Irmo). Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). County: Orangeburgh District to 1804, Lexington (County 1785-1791 and after 1804 if still extant). Variant location references: Irmo, Ballantine, Saluda River. History: Lutheran History (106ff., 138-139, 823-824).

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF ST. MATTHEW, CAMERON, S.C. Founded c.1735 as Amelia Township Church. Name changed c.1760s to St. Matthew. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788(see separate entry). Perhaps Lutheran in 1760s, Episcopalian about 1800, Lutheran again after 1824. County: Orangeburgh District 1770-1799, Orange County 1785-1791, Orangeburg District after 1800. Variant location references: Amelia Township, confluence of Congaree and Wateree Rivers to form the Santee River. History: Lutheran History (106ff., 131).

GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF ST. PETER, LEXINGTON, S.C. Founded 1780. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Lutheran after 1824. County: Orangeburgh District to 1804, Lexington (County 1785-1791, District after 1804). Variant locations: Eighteen Mile Creek, later on Eight Mile Creek (Saluda River?). GERMAN LUTHERAN CHURCH OF SALEMONSANDY RUN, SWANSEA, S.C. Founded c.1736. On west bank of Congaree River 1751, moved inland 1770 to Sandy Run Creek (which flows into the Congaree). Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Lutheran by 1811. County: Berkeley (Proprietary) to 1785 (and thus listed 1788), Orangeburg District 1769-1804, Lexington (County 1785-1791, District after 1804). History: Lutheran History (106ff., 133, 767-769).

GERMAN PROTESTANT CHURCH OF APPII FORUM, CEDAR CREEK, S.C. Founded 1761. Lutheran until 1777. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Methodist after 1791. County: Camden District 1769-1799, Richland County after 1785. Variant name: Presbyterian Church on Cedar Creek (Howe). Variant location reference: east side of Broad River, near Fairfield County line. History: Lu-

theran History (106ff., 141-42, 793); G. D. Bernheim, History of the German Settlements and of the Lutheran Church in North and South Carolina (Philadelphia, Pa.: The Lutheran Book Store, 1872), p. 310: Howe (I:494-495; II:82).

GERMAN PROTESTANT CHURCH OF BETHANY, ON GREEN CREEK, S.C. Incorporated 1788 with Corpus Evangelicum, (see separate entry) one of the "mystery churches of the Cor-County: Richland (Camden pus." District). Variant location references: Crim's Creek (but see German Calvinistic Church of St. John's in the Fork, Pomaria), Grame's Creek, (probably) Crane Creek (which flows into the Broad River). History: Lutheran History (106ff., 793); G. D. Bernheim, History of the German Settlements and of the Lutheran Church in North and South Carolina (Philadelphia, Pa.: The Lutheran Book Store, 1872), p. 310.

GERMAN PROTESTANT CHURCH OF QUEEN CHARLOTTE, ABBE-VILLE, S.C. Founded 1760s on Coffee Town Creek. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788 (see separate entry). Possibly Methodist by c.1800. County: Ninety-Six District 1760s-1799, Abbeville (County 1785-1799, District after 1800). Often listed as a variant name for the German Lutheran Church of St. George on Hard Labour Creek, identified by Lutheran History as a separate congregation (pp. 142-143). Variant location references: Slippery Creek, Hard Labour Settlement, Coffee Town Creek (which flows into Stevens Creek and then into the Savannah River).

GERMAN PROTESTANT CHURCH OF ST. GEORGE, DORCHESTER COUNTY, S.C. Flourished c.1790 in Charleston District. Member, Corpus Evangelicum 1788(see separate entry). Perhaps Methodist c.1800. Variant location references: Barnwell District, Indianfield Creek (which flows into the Edisto River), Indian Swamp, Indian Field Swamp. History: Lutheran History (106ff., esp. 112; 132); G. D. Bernheim, History of the German Settlements and of the Lutheran Church in North and South Carolina (Philadelphia, Pa.: The Lutheran Book Store, 1872), p. 310. (Also see German Lutheran Church of St. George.)

GERMAN REFORMED CHURCHES. See Corpus Evangelicum and individual churches: Bethesda auf der Moven, Frederician, German Calvinistic churches, German Lutheran churches, German Protestant churches, St. Bartholomews, St. Nicholas, St. Peter's in Piney Woods, and Turkeyhill Church.

GILBERT. See St. Pauls Church.

GILDER'S CREEK PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, NEWBERRY, S.C. NEW HOPE ASSOCIATE REFORMED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, BLACK-STOCK, S.C. Founded 1796. Previously a preaching point at Carnaham's (or Kerneyham's) Stand. Presbytery: Carolinas and Georgia 1796-1800, First (A.R.P.) 1800-1919, Catawba 1919-present. County: Camden District 1796-1799, Fairfield (County 1785-1799, District 1800-1868, County 1868-present). Variant name: Ebenezer (Centennial, p. 15). Variant location references: New Hope, North Fork of Little River (which flows into the Broad River).

History: Lathan (286, 296); Centennial (15, 528-529); Kennedy (492-494).

NEW HOPE PAROCHIAL SCHOOL, CAMDEN, S.C. A school sponsored by the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America 1893-1921. County: Kershaw 1893-1921. History: Parker (178-179).

NEW HOPE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ABBEVILLE, S.C. Founded 1973. Presbytery: Calvary 1973-present. County: Abbeville 1973-present.

HOPE PRESBYTERIAN NEW CHURCH, BISHOPVILLE (OR SUMTER), S.C. Founded 1804. Inactive c.1813. Reorganized 1831 and then merged 1838 into Bishopville Presbyterian Church. (Former New Hope members withdrew from Bishopville 1846 to form Hephzibah Presbyterian Church.) Reactivated as a preaching point 1895 at McLeod's Mill and reorganized 1898 at Antioch School House. Dissolved 1916. (Unclear continuity between 1838 church and 1898 church.) Presbytery: First South Carolina 1804-1809, Harmony 1809-1838 and 1898-1916. Presbyterian Church.)

NEW LIFE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ASSOCIATE REFORMED SYNOD, HARDEEVILLE, S.C. Founded 1982. Presbytery: Catawba 1982-present. County: Jasper 1982-present.

NEW LONDON. See Wilton Presbyterian Church.

NEW PICKENS PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. See Pickens Presbyterian Church.

NEWPORT. See Allison Creek Presbyterian Church.

NEW SCHOOL/OLD SCHOOL DIVISION. See Charleston Union Presbytery.

NEW SIDE/OLD SIDE DIVISION. See New York and Philadelphia Synod.

NEWTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, GREENVILLE COUNTY, S.C. Founded c.1796. Extinct before 1836. Presbytery: South Carolina to 1800, Second South Carolina 1800-1810, South Carolina thereafter. County: Washington District c.1796-1799, Greenville (County c.1796-1799, District thereafter). Variant location reference: Tyger River (which flows into the Broad River). History: Howe (II:138).

NEW PROSPECT. See Campobello Presbyterian Church.

NEW WAPPETAW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, McCLELLANVILLE, S.C. Founded 1872. Previously (from 1869) a preaching point. Successor to Wappetaw Church, through which it traces its history to 1697; see Wappetaw Church. Presbytery: Charleston 1872-

1988, Charleston-Atlantic 1988-present. County: Charleston 1872-present. Variant name: McClellanville Presbyterian Church. History: Howe (II:588); Jones and Mills (614-617); WPA Archive Survey.

NEW WESTMINSTER PRESBY-TERIAN CHURCH, SPARTANBURG, S.C. Founded c.1910, according to the WPA Archive Survey, and still active c.1939. No record found in any presbytery. (Possibly a confusion with Westminster/c.1884 in Spartanburg?) County: Spartanburg. History: WPA Archive Survey.

NEW WILLINGTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, WILLINGTON, S.C. Founded 1896. Merged 1912 into Willington Presbyterian Church. Presbytery: South Carolina 1896-1912. County: Abbeville 1896-1912.

NEW WINDSOR CONGREGATION. Listed by Charles A. Hanna in *The Scotch-Irish* (New York: G.P.Putnam's Sons, 1902), vol. 2, p. 97, and Howe (I:363) among congregations reported to Synod of New York and Philadelphia in 1768. Variant location reference: Savannah River.

NEW YORK AND PHILADELPHIA SYNOD (1758-1788). Organized 1758 by reunion of New York Synod ("New Side") and Philadelphia Synod ("Old Side"). Divided 1788 into four Synods: New York and New Jersey, Philadelphia, Virginia, and Carolinas. Presbyteries in South Carolina: Hanover 1758-1770, Orange 1770-1784, South Carolina 1784-1788 (this latter continuing in the Carolinas Synod after 1788). History: Howe (I:301, 562-563, 678ff.); E. T. NICHOLTOWN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, GREENVILLE, S.C. Founded 1961. Presbytery: Georgia-Carolina 1961-1965, Enoree 1965-1975, Piedmont 1975-1988, Foothills 1988-present. County: Greenville 1961-present. History: annual history updates (from 1970-) (at Montreat).

PRESBYTERIAN NINETY-SIX CHURCH, NINETY-SIX, S.C. Founded 1860. Presbytery: South Carolina 1860-1988, Trinity 1988-present. County: Abbeville (District 1860-1868, County 1868-1897), Greenwood 1897-present. History: Jones and Mills (1034-1039); annual history updates (from 1938-) (at Montreat); WPA Archive Survey. A previous church was organized c.1774 as Ninety-Six Presbyterian Church, its name subsequently changed to Cambridge; reorganized 1821 as Cambridge Presbyterian Church; dissolved c.1830. Presbytery: Orange to 1784, South Carolina 1784-c.1795 and 1821c.1830. Variant name: Old Cambridge Church. NORRIS HILL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ANDERSON, S.C. Founded 1968 as Anderson First Reformed Presbyterian Church. Name changed 1983. Presbytery: Southeast 1968-1982, Calvary 1982-present. County: Anderson 1968-present.

NORTH ANDERSON COMMUNITY CHURCH, PRESBYTERIAN, ANDER-SON, S.C. Founded 1971. Presbytery: Piedmont 1971-1988, Foothills 1988present. County: Anderson 1971-present. History: resumé history 1971-1981 (at Montreat).

NORTH AND SOUTH CAROLINA PRESBYTERY (1876-1951). Organized 1876 as an independent presbytery serving congregations in upper South Carolina and lower North Carolina; one of four presbyteries forming the Afro-American Presbyterian Church in 1898. North and South Carolina Presbytery probably absorbed Abbeville and Chester Presbyteries before its inclusion in the Presbyterian Church in the United States in 1916 (at which time it was the only remaining presbytery in the Afro-American Presbyterian Church). In 1951, South Carolina churches in North and South Carolina Presbytery were reassigned to Georgia-Carolina Presbytery in the Synod

of Georgia. Synod: Afro-American 1916 (renamed Snedecor Memorial 1917)-1951. General Assembly: Afro-American Presbyterian Church 1898-1916, Presbyterian Church in the United States 1916-1951. Through Fayetteville and Mecklenburg Presbyteries, North Carolina Synod occasionally enrolled South Carolina churches near the state border. NORTHERN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. Generally a reference to the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (1861-1957) and the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (1957-1983). (See separate entries.)

NORTHMINSTER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, COLUMBIA, S.C. Founded 1969. Presbytery: Fairfield-McClelland 1969-1988, Trinity 1988-present. County: Richland 1969-present.

NORTHMINSTER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, GREENVILLE, S.C. Founded 1941. Dissolved 1979. Presbytery: Piedmont 1941-1979. County: Greenville 1941-1979. History: brief history in Piedmont Presbytery Minutes 1980; annual history updates (1941-1979) (at Montreat).

NORTHMINSTER PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ROCK HILL, S.C. Founded 1949. Merged 1965 into Covenant Presbyterian Church, Rock Hill. Presbytery: Bethel 1949-1965. County: York 1949-1965. History: annual history updates (1953-1964) (at Montreat).

NORTH MYRTLE BEACH. See Ocean Drive Presbyterian Church.

NORTH PACOLET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. See Pacolet Presbyterian Church and Campobello Presbyterian Church.

NORTHWESTERN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ROCK HILL, S.C. Founded 1984. Dissolved 1985. Presbytery: Bethel. County: York.

NORWOOD CROSS ROAD. See Olanta First Presbyterian Church.

NURSERY ROAD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, COLUMBIA, S.C. Founded 1982. Presbytery: Calvary 1982-1984, Palmetto 1984-present. County: Richland 1982-present.

OAKBROOK MISSION, SUMMER-VILLE, S.C. Palmetto Presbytery mission c.1985-present. Not an organized church. County: Dorchester.

OAKDALE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, CLOVER, S.C. Founded 1951. Presbytery: Bethel 1951-1988, Providence 1988-present. County: York 1951-present. History: annual history updates (from 1951-) (at Montreat).

OAKHURST. See Beaver Creek Presbyterian Church.

OAKLAND AVENUE PRESBY-TERIAN CHURCH, COLUMBIA, S.C. Founded 1952. Dissolved 1966. Presbytery: Congaree 1952-1966. County: Richland 1952-1966. History: resumé history 1946-1953 with annual updates (to 1963) (at Montreat).

OAKWAY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, WESTMINSTER, S.C. Founded 1898. Dissolved 1925. Presbytery: South Carolina 1898-1909, Piedmont 1909-1925. County: Oconee 1898-1925. Variant location reference: Oakway.

OBED. See Mt. Lebanon View Presbyterian Church.

OCEAN DRIVE FIRST PRESBY-TERIAN CHURCH, OCEAN DRIVE, S.C. Founded 1947. Presbytery: Pee Dee 1947-1988, New Harmony 1988-present. County: Horry 1947-present. Variant location reference: North Myrtle Beach. History: annual history updates (from 1952-) (at Montreat).

OCONEE ASSOCIATE REFORMED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, SENECA, S.C. Founded 1988. Previously (from 1985) a mission. Presbytery: Second (A.R.P.). County: Oconee.

OCONEE COUNTY. See churches listed in entries for these towns: Clemson, Fair Play, Keowee, Madison, Pickens Court House, Richland, Seneca, Walhalla, and Westminster. OLD BETHEL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, HAMER, S.C. Founded 1967 ("re-organized," perhaps successor to Bethel Presbyterian Church, Hamer, which merged 1964 with New Liberty Presbyterian Church, Dillon). Presbytery: Georgia-Carolina 1967-1968, Pee Dee 1968-1988, New Harmony 1988-present. County: Dillon 1967-present. History: annual history updates (c.1970s) (at Montreat). Church 1882-1894 and again c.1935-1953. Dissolved 1953 with transfer of entire membership to Ora Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. OLD NATHAN'S PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, MANNING, S.C. Founded 1920 by a Rev. Nathan ("from the North;" local people "ran him out"). Abandoned 1922. Presbytery: possibly Fairfield, but more likely not an organized church. County: Clarendon 1920-1922. History: WPA Archive Survey.

OLD PICKENS PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, SENECA, S.C. Founded 1848 as Pickens Court House Presbyterian Church. Name changed to Old Pickens c. 1883. (Also see Pickens Presbyterian Church.) Dissolved 1967. OLD RUINS. See especially Cainhoy Presbyterian Church; also a descriptive term for other churches.

OLD SCHOOL/NEW SCHOOL DIVI-SION. See Charleston Union Presbytery; also see Williamston Presbyterian Church.

OLD SIDE/NEW SIDE DIVISION. See New York and Philadelphia Synod.

OLD STONE CHURCH. Usually a reference to Pendleton (then called Hopewell) Presbyterian Church building erected c.1800, but also see Lebanon Presbyterian Church, Winnsboro; sometimes a descriptive term for other churches.

OLD WAXHAW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, LANCASTER, S.C. Founded 1755 as Waxhaw Presbyterian Church (or Presbyterian Church of the Waxhaws). Previously (as early as 1751) a preaching point. Name changed c.1950 to Old Waxhaw (also often called Old Waxhaw in the nineteenth century). OLIVET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, CHARLESTON, S.C. Founded 1879. Previously a chapel of Wallingford Presbyterian Church. Merged 1959 with Zion Presbyterian Church to form Zion-Olivet Presbyterian Church. Presbytery: Atlantic 1879-1959.

OLIVET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, YORK, S.C. Founded 1842. Inactive c.1865. Reorganized 1868. Presbytery: Independent Presbyterian Church 1842-1863, Bethel 1863-1973, Calvary 1973-present. County: York 1868-present. Variant location reference: McConnellsville. History: Jones and Mills (555-557); resumé history 1842-1945 with annual updates (at Montreat); WPA Archive Survey. (Also see Olivet Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church.)





UNION CHURCH. In addition to churches listed with this name, "Union Church" is sometimes a reference to interdenominational facilities shared by several congregations, often as an "incubator" for new churches or as a community center; such a facility sometimes also is called a Unity Chapel or Harmony Church. The reference may also be to a congregation affiliated with two or more presbyteries in separate denominations. UNION OF CHURCHES. See Corpus Evangelicum.

UNION PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ABBEVILLE, S.C. Founded 1952. Presbytery: South Carolina 1952-1974, Calvary 1974-present. County: Abbeville 1952-present.

UNION PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, SALTERS, S.C. Founded 1863. Previously (from 1857) a preaching point and chapel of Williamsburg Presbyterian Church. Presbytery: Harmony 1863-1973, Calvary 1973-1984, Palmetto 1984-present. County: Williamsburg (District 1863-1868, County 1868-present). History: Jones and Mills (839-842); annual history updates (1941-1972) (at Montreat); Henry E. Davis, History of the Union Presbyterian Church and the Salters Community (n.p., 1963), 35 pp. (at Montreat); WPA Archive Survey.

UNION SECOND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, UNION, S.C. Founded 1951. Presbytery: Enoree 1951-1975, Piedmont 1975-1988, Providence 1988-present. County: Union 1951-present. History: annual history updates (from 1951-) (at Montreat).

UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. Organized 1957 by merger of the United Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. Merged 1983 with the Presbyterian Church in the United States to form the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Synods with presbyteries in South Carolina: Atlantic 1957-1967, South Carolina-Georgia 1967-1973, South 1973-1983. (See entry for each synod for lists of presbyteries in South

Carolina.)

UNITED PRESBYTERIANS. Generally a reference to churches affiliated with the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (1957-1983). Such churches in South Carolina often included "United" in the name of the local church during that period.

UNITY ASSOCIATE REFORMED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, LAN-CASTER, S.C. Founded 1875 in division of Tirzah Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church (see separate entry). UNITY ASSOCIATE REFORMED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, NEW-BERRY, S.C. Founded 1902. Previously (from 1901) a preaching point at Garmany Academy. Dissolved 1947. Presbytery: Second (A.R.P.) 1903-1947. County: Newberry 1903-1947. Variant location reference: Garmany. History: Centennial (602); Kennedy (588); WPA Archive Survey.

UNITY CHAPEL (OR CHURCH). See Union Church for categorical term.

UNITY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, FORTMILL, S.C. Founded 1788. Name changed 1881 to Fort Mill Presbyterian Church (perhaps earlier, with move of the church into the town of Fort Mill in 1838, but carried in presbytery records as Unity to 1881) and 1924 back to Unity Presbyterian Church. Presby-

VIETNAMESE CHRISTIAN CHURCH, COLUMBIA, S.C. Founded 1981. Dissolved 1985. Presbytery: Catawba 1981-1985. County: Richland 1981-1985.

WACCAMAW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, BUCKSPORT, S.C. Founded 1898. Presbytery: Pee Dee 1898-1988, New Harmony 1988-present. County: Horry 1898-present.

WACCAMAW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, KINGSTON(CONWAY), S.C. Founded 1734. Extinct before 1858. Predecessor of Kingston Presbyterian Church, Conway. Name changed 1951 to Wade Memorial, 1968 to Wade Presbyterian Church. Presbytery: Bethel 1949-1988, Providence 1988-present. County: Lancaster 1949-present. History: resumé history to 1958 with annual updates (at Montreat).

WADMALAW ISLAND. In addition to the entry under this name, see Salem Presbyterian Church.

WADMALAW ISLAND PRESBY-TERIAN CHURCH, WADMALAW ISLAND, S.C. Founded c.1793. Listed by Charles A. Hanna, *The Scotch-Irish*  (New York: Putnam's Sons, 1902), vol. 2, p. 117. Howe regarded this as a singlechurch (The Presbyterian Church of John's Island and Wadmalaw Island) by 1810. Whether Wadmalaw was a separate church or a branch of John's Island before that time is unclear. (See Johns Island Presbyterian Church.)

WALES CONGREGATION. Reported to the Synod of New York and Philadelphia 1768, according to Charles A. Hanna, *The Scotch-Irish* (New York: Putnam's Sons, 1902), vol. 2, p. 97, and Howe (I:363).





WANDO RIVER CHURCHES (before 1850). See Cooper River Churches.

WAPPETAW INDEPENDENT CON-GREGATIONAL CHURCH, McCLEL-LANVILLE, S.C. Founded c.1700. Previously (from 1696) a Congregational settlement. Dissolved c.1865. Succeeded by New Wappetaw Presbyterian Church (1872) and Mt. Pleasant Presbyterian Church (1870). 
