I rather think that Gates has gone on to Virginia & perhaps to Congress, to exculpate himself and press for Reinforcements, but this is only surmise from what dropped from the Surgeon? You may depend on hearing from me frequently. It is wonderful that we have no Accounts from the Northward.
