A Brief History of Bethesda Presbyterian Church

The name Bethesda was originally given to a region of York County, South Carolina, approximately 16 square miles in size. The Bethesda region was initially populated with immigrants from the northern part of Ireland, the majority being Presbyterians. Many of these early settlers came directly from Ireland, while others migrated down from Pennsylvania or up from the lower part of South Carolina. Early chronicles show Bethesda Church as located 8 miles Southeast of York, 13 miles Northeast of Chester, 20 miles from the Broad River on the West, and 17 miles from the Catawba River on the East.

Bethesda became a preaching station in 1760, the year during which the worshiping families of the community built a plain wooden building located about one mile east of the present church buildings. Around this place of worship they also buried their dead. The year of official organization as a Presbyterian Church is not known with absolute certainty, but most sources name the year as 1769. The person responsible for the organization is generally thought to have been Reverend William Richardson, who at the time was stationed at Waxhaw Church.

Along with Reverend Richardson, some of the early ministers to supply Bethesda were Reverend Joseph Alexander who served Bullocks Creek, and Reverend Hezekiah J. Balch of Bethel. In 1774 Reverend John Simpson of Fishing Creek Presbyterian Church supplied Bethesda with half his time, which he did until the close of the Revolutionary War. Reverend Simpson served Bethesda again in the late 1780's until 1791. Between 1791 and 1794 Bethesda was served by supply ministers from Presbytery when they were available.

In 1794 Bethesda's first full time pastor, Reverend Robert B. Walker was installed and ordained and whose pastoral relationship lasted forty years. Under Reverend Walker, known as Father Walker, Bethesda enjoyed great prosperity marked by rapid and extensive growth. He was instrumental in lifting the church to great spiritual growth. Father Walker attended The Great Revivals of 1796-1805, which started in Kentucky and Tennessee, returning to Bethesda with much vigor to teach his congregation at Bethesda and the surrounding area. From these activities the Camp Meetings at Bethesda began in 1802 and continued until 1864. People came from as far away as 40 miles and camped in wooden tents erected about the church grounds. A large wooden arbor that could accommodate 2,000 worshipers was built in 1859.

John Fondren donated the original 7 acre tract of land in 1771 where Bethesda Presbyterian Church now stands. An additional 10 acres were bought later from Richard Strait and John Swann, Jr. Over the years additional acreage has been added.

The original wood building used for worship was consumed by fire in 1780. Another building was erected a few feet south of the present house of worship. It was a wooden framed building with sides covered in split clapboards and it stood for nearly forty years. In 1820 the present house of worship was constructed with bricks. After about 20 years, two of the original walls had to be torn down and rebuilt because of a defect in the original design. Additional repairs were made in 1857 with the brick floor being replaced by a wooden one and the antique wine glass pulpit by one of more modern design.

Extensive improvements were made to the church in 1882 by an extension in back of the pulpit that recessed the pulpit and added a session room, the pews were placed closer and new ones added. Other improvements were new gallery posts, enlarged windows, carpet, and new pulpit furniture. Matching pulpit chairs, a communion table, and a chandelier were gifts from the Women of the Church. The women also replaced the pewter communion set with a silver service, and the velvet collection bags on the ends of long rods gave way to modern plates. Considerable work was again done in 1917. In 1977 Bethesda Presbyterian Church was placed on the National Register of Historic Places and extensive changes were made to restore the building to more closely resemble its original design.

A manse was in use by 1874, which was located on The Armstrong Ford Road that ran behind the present church building. In 1910 Clara Lindsay and Kate Williamson gave land for a manse in the area of Guthriesville, near present day McConnells. An engine fire burned this manse in 1935. Another manse was built near the same spot and remained in use until 1973 when the present manse was constructed on the church grounds.

Bethesda has continued to build during its over 250 years of Ministry; including an Educational Building (1954), Fellowship Hall (1959), Manse (1973), Tennis and Basketball Court (1977) that now includes a covered Picnic Shelter, and a Family Life Center (1992) that includes a Child Development Center.

In January 1779, he volunteered under Kirkpatrick and was against the Tories at Fair Forest. He was later drafted under Kirkpatrick and Maj. Ross and was at the Battle at Briar Creek. In December 1780, he volunteered to go to New Bern, North Carolina as a wagoner under William Given, wagon master. In May 1782, he was drafted under Capt. John Hillhouse and Col. Bratton and served at Four Hole Bridge. Shortly after Ferguson's defeat at King's Mountain, he volunteered again and served at Turkey Creek and Sandy River.

Bratton was commissioned as a Captain in 1775 in the New Acquisition Militia Regiment, and between 1775 and 1779 he served in battles including the Snow Campaign, the Cherokee Expedition, and the battles of Briar Creek and Stono Ferry. Bratton, along with Capt. John McClure and Rev. Simpson of Fishing Creek Church, organized a new militia company and attacked and dispersed a group of Tories at Mobley's Meeting House. Under the command of Bratton, McClure and other local officers, the Tories and British Provincial soldiers were ambushed and

defeated at the battle of Williamson's Plantation(Huck's Defeat). Bratton continued to serve honorably as a Colonel in Gen. Thomas Sumter's brigade until the end of hostilities in late 1782. Other battles in which he fought in 1780 and 1781 were Rocky Mount, Hanging Rock, Fishdam Ford, Blackstock's Plantation, Fort Granby, Fort Motte, Wright's Bluff, Biggin's Church, and Eutaw Springs.

Bratton and was in an engagement at Catawba Ford. He lost a horse at Sumter's Defeat. Next, he served in a Virginia Unit. He returned to South Carolina and in March 1782 served under a Capt. Meek and Maj. James Wallace. (Moved to Mo.) He was present at the Battle of Williamson's Plantation (Huck's Defeat).
