


A congregational meeting was held J. A. Boyd. at Clover church November 1, 1882, for the purpose of electing a pastor. The minutes of this meeting show that a Mr. J. A. Boyd nominated Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick of the Mecklenburg Presbytery, who was duly elected and the following committee was appointed to prosecute this call for Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick: Dr. A. P. Campbell and Mr. John R. Barron. Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick began preaching December 6. 1882, but was not installed until May 5th, 1883.

During the year 1881 a dwelling was built by Mr. J. A. Wilson. Upon his leaving Clover this building was purchased as a manse for the sum of \$900. With some additional changes, it is now occupied by Mr. Thes. T. B. Williams.

It is to be presumed that work had been done in the Sunday school before Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick came, however, on January 21, 1883, the minutes show that the Sunday school was re-organized with the following officers and eachers:

## Call For Pastor.

Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick was called for three-fourths of his time. Shiloh asking for the other fourth. This arrangement continued until Shiloh was transferred to Mecklenburg Presbytery at her own request October 7. 1884. This left Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick with one-fourth of his time vacant until arrangements were made with Black's church, now called Blacksburg, who called him for one-fourth of his

Under the kind but exacting leadership of Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick Clover church made much progress. He was an untiring worker, going in and out among his people as a representative of his Christ. He was especially interested in his Sunday school work and thereby did much for the future citizens of Clover by giving them wholecome instruction.

Rev. M. R. Kirkpatrick resigned March 1, 1891. Clover was fortunate in having him for its head during its formative period.

## Call For Rev. S. H. Hay.

At a congregational meeting held April 26, 1891, Rev. S. H Hay was called. At this time he was pastor at Old Folks, Class No. 1-Teacher, Uriel. However, he had previously been in Charleston Presbytery.

In reading over the minutes of the sessions in those early days one is struck with the frequence of the calls on the part of the session to the members of the church to come before the session and explain why they had not attended church services regularly or why they had not lived up to other Work taken up joining the church.

Prom 1881 to 1905 the church had grown from the original 84 charter members to 160 communicants.

#### Rev. A. A. McLain.

At a congregational meeting held October 12, 1913, Rev. A. A. McLain, of Mangum Presbytery, Oklahoma, was called. He was installed November 16, 1913. From the year 1905 to 1918 Clover had made rapid gain in her membership. The town had grown rapidly and there were now 313 communicants on the roll. September 30, 1918, the congregation, by a unanimous vote, decided to ask Bethel Presbytery to allow them to have a full time pastor, Rev. A. A. McLain having resigned August 18. 1918. It was during the pastorate of Rev. A. A. McLain that a definite movement was started to build a new church, however, the World war stopped this temporarily.

## Pipe Organ Installed.

In 1924 soon after the new church building had been finished the ladies auxiliary decided that with a little help from the men of the church they would buy and install a pipe organ this was done in 1924 by M. P. Moller Hagerstown, Md., at a cost of about \$4,500. The ladies agreeing to pay \$4,000 in four years-they paid this off in three years. The ladies paid \$1,000 on the seats for the new building.

At present the ladies are paying \$750 a year on the new manse and their total budget is well above \$1.500 There are 10 circles with a membership of 176.
