The Record, Feb 23, 1914:

Mrs. W. J. Roddey, hostess of Kaffee Klatch Club in her "elegant and palatial home" which has just recently been completed. Guests admired the "dainty and artistic rooms" and listened to "delightful music" on the Victrola. Daughters Catherine and Elizabeth Roddey helped their mother entertain. Guests were 11 KK members and 16 visitors.
