Brick industrial complex has large rectangular principal block with off-center engaged towers at each elevation, large rectangular operatory addition to west with additions to north; three-story addition at south. One-story detached warehouse to east; detached smokestack. Low-gable roof at principal block; flat roofs at one-story sections; segmental arched openings at all levels of principal block.

The mill and its village were built on a 116-acre tract. After a 1994 merger the mill was known as Aragon-Baldwin Cotton Mills Aragon Plant; in 1948 it became the Aragon-Baldwin division (2007)
