**JAMES OTHO DUNLAP, M. D.**—His native city, Rock Hill, York County, has been the scene of Dr. Dunlap's successful professional activities as a physician and surgeon ever since the completion of his medical studies and training. Though he is one of the younger generation of medical practitioners in York County, he has already made for himself an enviable reputation and is regarded as an exceptionally able and skillful physician and surgeon. As a result he enjoys a large and steadily growing practice. Dr. Dunlap is a member of several medical organizations and is also active in Masonic affairs and in the work of his church.

James Otho Dunlap was born at Rock Hill, York County, April 17, 1905, a son of John James and Jessie Lillian Dunlap, both still residents of Rock Hill. His father is a farmer. Dr. Dunlap is a member of an old and well known South Carolina family. The Dunlaps came to this country from Ireland, settled in Chester County, South Carolina, and were loyal members of the Presbyterian Church. John James Dunlap was a native of Chester County, where he was reared. However, he spent the greater part of his life in York County, where he was engaged in farming. He was a son of Robert Dunlap and a veteran of the War Between the States, during which he served under General Greenleaf. He married Elizabeth Duncan. Dr. Dunlap's maternal grandfather, Robert Duncan, was employed by the government as general manager of a large farm in Upper York County during the War Between the States. Having received his early education in the public schools, Dr. Dunlap spent one year at Wofford College and then studied for four years at the University of North Carolina, where he was a member of the class of 1926 and from which institution he was graduated with the degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1927. The next two years he spent in post-graduate work at the University of Pennsylvania, serving also during the last of these two years as an interne of the United States Veterans' Hospital. After returning to South Carolina from Philadelphia, Dr. Dunlap became an interne at the Fennell in-

firmery at Rock Hill. In June, 1930, he established himself in the general practice of medicine and surgery at Rock Hill, in which he has continued since then with much success. His high professional standing in his home community is indicated by the fact that he has served as president of the Rock Hill Medical Society. He is also a member of the York County Medical Society, the South Carolina State Medical Society and the American Medical Association, as well as of University Lodge, at Chapel Hill, North Carolina, Free and Accepted Masons. His religious affiliations are with the Methodist Episcopal Church and more particularly with St. John's Methodist Episcopal Church of Rock Hill.

**C. B. HAYNES**—As superintendent of schools of Inman, C. B. Haynes has the oversight of a system in which there are a corps of twenty-five teachers and an enrollment of eight hundred pupils. He has a large experience in educational work, covering a period of nearly twenty-five years, entirely in this State. He is a son of Marcus L. Haynes, who was born in Clyde, North Carolina, in 1861, a farmer, and of Ada (Jones) Haynes, who was born at Asheville, North Carolina, in 1861, and died May 18, 1925.

One of ten children, of whom nine are living, C. B. Haynes was born in Clyde, Haywood County, North Carolina, April 29, 1882. He received his early education in the country schools of his native district, and took his preparatory course at the high school of Pacolet Mills, Spartanburg County. He next entered the University of South Carolina, from which he received his degree at graduation in the class of 1908. For three years after graduation he was teacher and principal at West Springs, this State, and then he was invited to be principal of schools of Chesnee, Spartanburg County, where he was stationed for six years. He accepted the call of the Inman authorities to be superintendent of schools there in 1918 and he has since held the position.

Mr. Haynes married, in 1921, Edna Hill Cox, of Abbeville, a daughter of Robert E. and Jennie (McIlwain) Cox, and they are the parents of a daughter, Edna Hill, born September 29, 1925.

**JOSEPH EVANS BRUNSON, M.
