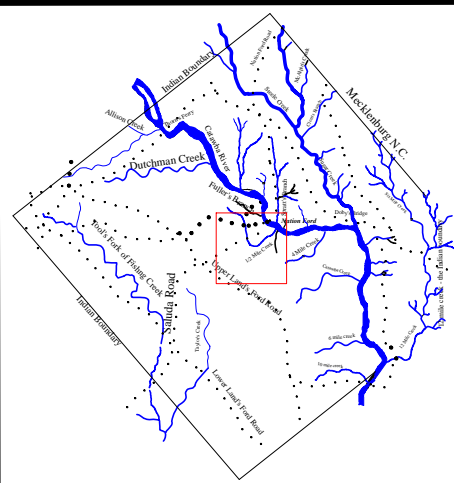

Prior to 1840 all White settlers living within the Indian Reservation leased land from the Catawba Indians. After the Treaty of Nation Ford in 1840, the Indians traded away their rights to the reservation for \$21,000. All former leaseholders were then required by the State of South Carolina to have their land surveyed in order to gain clear title.
