

Miscellaneous items from Fort Mill Times 1892, 1900, 1901

Mr. Jack Kimbrell and Policeman Potts were wrestling last evening when Mr. Kimbrell fell and severely sprained his ankle. He has been confined to his room ever since (June 15, 1892)

W. J. Kimbrell, mail-carrier, has route from Fort Mill to Barberville, Pleasant Valley, Harrison's, Ardreys and Belair. (April 4, 1900) [Note: Ardreys & perhaps Harrison were in North Carolina; the other routes were in the Lancaster County Indian Land.]

Squire W. O. Bailes writes the Times that last Sunday (April 1) was a very busy day with him. There were four weddings (which included) . . . W. F. Thompson and Miss Minnie Bailes. (April 4, 1900)

John P. Bailes, who has been a student at South Carolina College for several months, returned to his home in the community (Pleasant Valley) one day last week. He had been in ill health for some time and will probably not return to college during the present season. (April 25, 1900)

Dallas Kimbrell is sick at his home near Fort Mill. (May 23, 1900)

Fort Mill Confederate pensioners included: W. T. Alderson, Joseph Parks, W. T. Pettus, J. R. Kimbrell, Mrs. S. Billue, Mrs. Martha Coltharpe. (May 30, 1900)

Fort Mill Light Infantry formed. Members include privates L. A. Kimbrell and B. S. Kimbrell. (June 30, 1900)

Mr. A. R. Kimbrell has sold his interest in the firm of E. W. Kimbrell & Co. and will return to Rock Hill within a short time to accept a position as salesman with A. Friedheim & Bro. (September 5, 1900)

For some days past a young gentleman and lady have been quietly preparing their future home in this place. There at 9:00 last evening they were joined in holy wedlock by Rev. J. H. Thornwell. The contracting parties were Mr. Edward W. Kimbrell of Fort Mill and Miss Myra Fravor of Baldwinsville, N. Y. About forty relatives and friends witnessed the ceremony, among the number being Mr. and Ms. Andrews of Atlanta. The home was tastefully decorated for the occasion and music was furnished by Mr. L. J. Massey. A number of handsome presents were received. Mr. Kimbrell is one of Fort Mill's popular young businessmen and has a host of friends who will heartily congratulate him on his happy marriage. Mr. Kimbrell has lived in Fort Mill only two years but during that time has become very popular with all our people. (November 7, 1900)

Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Kimbrell, who have been living in Steel Creek for several years, visited relatives in the community recently. They left yesterday morning for Greenville, where Mr. Kimbrell will be employed as a superintendent of a creamery. (November 14, 1900)

Confederate crosses were awarded to Confederate veterans in a ceremony. (Those receiving the crosses included J. P. Bailes, J. H. Coltharpe, J. R. Kimbrell, J. S. Kimbrell, W. T. Pettus, J. H. Kimbrell.) (December 14, 1900)

Obituary of Mrs. Clara Porter, wife of late Capt. W. M. Porter, died at the home of her son A. A. Porter in Steel Creek. She was 75 and a member of Pleasant Hill Presbyterian Church. An aunt of Mrs. D. G. Kimbrell.

J. J. Bailes a student at Wofford is at the home of his father, J. P. Bailes. (December 19, 1900)

Death of Mrs. Julia Sewell at Durham, N. C., wife of George L. Sewell. She was afflicted with consumption, age 30, mother of 4 children. The daughter of J. R. Kimbrell. (Jan 3, 1901)

Starr Kimbrell left for extended visit to relatives in Jonesboro, Ark. (January 10, 1901)
